Celebrate Kumbhotsav!

A few days ago, we went to Nashik for a program. We thought that the Kumbh Mela that will be held in Nashik in 2026-27 would be in full swing for that Kumbh Mela. We deliberately inquired. But the funny thing is that no management has been started for the Kumbh Mela in Nashik yet. Last year, a very large-scale planning and arrangement of the Kumbh Mela was done in Prayagraj, it is said that the preparations for it had been going on since five years ago. In addition, it is also said that the Uttar Pradesh government had earned crores of rupees due to the Kumbh Mela. For many, the preparations for the Kumbh Mela, i.e. the Simhashta, were being witnessed in person from a tent rented for a thousand rupees. Here in our Nashik area, a debate has started between Nashik or Trimbakeshwar. The Akhara Parishad and the Sadhu Mahant were making a lot of noise about this. The dates for the Amrit Snan of this Simhashta were not being fixed. Due to all this, there were reports of a lot of fighting between the Akhara Parishad, Sadhu-Mahant and Purohit Sangh. In fact, the Purohit Sangh and Sadhu-Mahant take the initiative in determining the dates of Amrit Snan. A total of six Amrit Snans are performed in this Simhashta or Kumbh Mela. Out of these, three are divided into three for Shivas and three for Vaishnavites. It is necessary for the government, police administration, and other systems to be ready for the Simhashta festival. The Chief Minister announcing the dates of Amrit Snans. This is a sign that the Sundopasundi in the Akhara is going on. In our country, this Kumbha Mela is famous for the name of Nashik. But this time the name of this Simhashta will be Trimbakeshwar-Nashik. It can be said that the Chief Minister has given more importance to Trimbakeshwar than Nashik. As we have said above, the work of Kumbha Mela in other places starts much earlier. Kumbha Mela has an attraction for the whole world. This requires a lot of planning. Many development works have to be done. Currently, since the central government and the state government are of the same party, there is no possibility of any problem anywhere. Plans worth almost Rs 25,000 crore have been prepared for the Kumbh Mela. But it is said that the government has not yet decided on that. Till we were in Nashik ten to twelve days ago, not even a single penny had come from the government. It is said that the initial works worth almost Rs 6,000 crore have not even started. It is said that a tender of more than Rs 15,000 crore has been floated for the cleaning of Godavari. It is said that the local Shiv Sena has objected to it. The land required for the residence of the sadhus and mahants there. The planning for that has not even started yet. It was expected that the Nashik king would have this tremendously attractive management like the Prayagraj king. But in Maharashtra, which is many times richer and more developed than Uttar Pradesh, the planning committee for the work of the Simhashta has not even been announced yet. Sadhus and saints should be included in that planning committee. Strong efforts are being made for this. But there does not seem to be any peace there either. The Nashik area where this grand ceremony is going to be held. The government with a huge majority has not yet been able to provide a simple guardian minister for that district. It seems that Girish Mahajan has been entrusted with the overall management of the Simhashta Mela. But since the rest of the important public representatives of this district are equally important for this Simhashta festival, it is necessary to entrust them with important tasks. How the religious flag of this Simhashta will be hoisted under the burden of differences and mutual distrust is a very important question. Ten to fifteen crore devotees will come to this Simhashta with great devotion. There was a large loss of life in the stampede in the Prayagraj area. Such a thing should not happen or be tarnished in Maharashtra, which is disciplined and most progressive and also a planner. This is the expectation of well-wishing and devoted people like us. The kind of expensive arrangements that were made in Prayagraj. Such arrangements were not made. However, at least guest number one, which means VVIP, guest number two, which means VIP, guest number three, which means IP and guest number four, which means P, which means the general public, can all take bath in the Kumbh Parva with ease. Such an arrangement is necessary. In the previous Kumbh Mela in Nashik, there was extreme anger everywhere due to excessive security. Therefore, this time too, there is a lot of apathy among the local people in Nashik city. The Chief Minister of Uttar Pradesh had given global fame to the Kumbh Mela in his state. Maharashtra, which once hoisted the Marathi flag in many parts of the country, has an opportunity on the occasion of this Simhashta to show its Maharashtra flag by unhindered hoisting it. The entire people, under the leadership of Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis, should make a determination to make this Kumbh Mela on the banks of Godavari a success by pouring a lot of planning into the Kumbh of such a Simhashta Kumbh Mela. That determination should succeed without any hindrance. This is our only wish that everyone should celebrate the Kumbhotsav.

Bridge on Indrayani river collapses; 2 killed, several feared swept away

Pune 15 June: An old bridge collapsed over the Indrayani River near Kundamala village in Maharashtra's Pune district on Sunday. Two people have died, and around five to seven rescued people have been sent to the hospital, police confirmed. "This was an old dilapidated iron bridge that collapsed around 4 PM. According to the preliminary information, 2 people have died and around 5-7 rescued people have been sent to the hospital... NDRF and local police have been deployed for the rescue operation..." said Zone 2 DCP Vishal Gaikwad. Meanwhile, a search operation is being conducted on a war footing as some people are swept away. The incident happened under the jurisdiction of the Pimpri-



Chinchwad Police. According to initial reports, five to six people have been rescued. "Ten to fifteen people are feared trapped. Five to six people have been rescued. More details are awaited," the Pimpri-Chinchwad Police told journalists. One of the members carrying out the rescue

operation told reporters, "The rescue operation is underway. Some people have been saved. We don't know for sure, but possibly 20-25 people are likely trapped under the debris of the collapsed bridge." Following the bridge collapse, Maharashtra Chief

Minister Devendra Fadnavis confirmed that the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) and local authorities are conducting rescue operations. Following the incident, NCP (SP) MP Supriya Sule tweeted, "A bridge over the Indrayani river collapsed at Kundamala in Maval taluka of Pune district. It is feared that some citizens on the bridge may have been swept away. This incident is very unfortunate, and I pray to God that all these citizens are safe. I have spoken to the District Collector, Pune, regarding this incident, and he is sending all necessary help. My humble request to the citizens is that they please take necessary precautions while going for monsoon tourism. Follow the safety rules strictly."

Wani trio die in helicopter mishap

WANI / RAMESH TAMBE / NAGPUR POST: Mourning has spread in Wani city and Yavatmal district after the death of coal businessman Rajkumar Jaiswal, his wife and two-year-old daughter in a helicopter accident at Kedarnath. Rajkumar Jaiswal was returning from Kedarnath by helicopter at 5:20 am today, June 15, when the helicopter crashed due to bad weather. It has been reported that seven people including the pilot died in it. According to the Uttarakhand Civil Aviation Authority, the passengers include passengers from Maharashtra, Uttar Pradesh, Rajasthan, Uttarakhand, and Gujarat. Three members of the same family, Rajkumar Jaiswal, 41, a coal businessman from Nandepera Road Wani in Yavatmal district of Maharashtra, Shradha Rajkumar Jaiswal and Kashi Rajkumar Jaiswal, 2, died in this helicopter. A year ago, Rajkumar Jaiswal had organized a Kashi Mahashivpuran story in the name of his daughter. Thousands of devotees from



Maharashtra and other states attended this. Rajkumar Jaiswal was a friendly person and was a pioneer in any religious programme. Fortunately, his son was with his grandfather in Pandharkawada. Due to the death of Rajkumar Jaiswal in a helicopter crash, there is mourning in Yavatmal district and the Wani area.

Mumbai, June 15 (UNI) Maharashtra Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis on Sunday expressed grief over the death of all seven people on board a helicopter, ferrying pilgrims from Kedarnath, that crashed near Gaurikund in Uttarakhand Sunday morning. A toddler was among the deceased. Fadnavis extended his condolences over the loss of lives, particularly the three victims

from his state. In his message on X, he wrote, "Deeply pained by the tragic accident where passengers lost their lives in a helicopter crash near Gaurikund in Uttarakhand this morning while travelling from Kedarnath to Guptkashi. Among the victims were devotees from Maharashtra as well. I express my deepest condolences to the bereaved families. We stand in solidarity with all those affected."

Pune gangster killed in encounter with cops

Pune, June 15 (UNI) A notorious criminal was killed in alleged encounter with Pune Crime Branch team in Solapur district on Sunday. Criminal was identified as Shahrulkh Rahim Sheikh alias Atty (23). Shahrulkh was absconding and Pune police were looking for him for a long time. The results were announced on Saturday. A consistent performer, Umaid had earlier achieved 95.6% in both his Class X and XII board exams. Expressing his long-standing passion for medicine, Umaid shared that his journey began in Class IX, with a firm resolve to crack NEET. He now aims to pursue MBBS at the prestigious All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS), New Delhi. Recalling the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, Umaid said, "Watching doctors confront immense challenges during the crisis made me realise the urgent need for more medical professionals in our country. A growing number of doctors will help ease the burden on existing ones and improve healthcare outcomes."

Offering guidance to aspiring NEET candidates, he stressed the importance of choosing medicine thoughtfully. "This field demands unwavering dedication and deep academic focus. It's not a decision to be made in haste," he advised. Umaid hails from a supportive family background. His father, Furquan Ahmed Khan, is a civil engineer, while his mother, Shaheen Parveen, is a homemaker. He is the youngest of three brothers—Adeel Khan, an MTech in Structural Engineering, and Areeb Khan, a final-year MBBS student at Government Medical College, Yavatmal. Grateful for the encouragement he received, Umaid said, "My family and teachers have been my pillars of strength. My brother's guidance helped me navigate challenges, and I learned to focus on self-improvement instead of comparisons."

Youth commits suicide

Mul 15 June (NAGPUR POST): Vinod Bhaui Chaudhari (35) years old, resident of Maroda Adarsh Nagar, situated at a distance of about 9 km from Mul, hanged himself in his own field in Somnath area. A young man committed suicide by hanging himself in a field in Somnath area. Someone saw the body hanging from a mango tree and informed the people of Maroda village about it, after which people from Maroda reached there and it became clear that the body hanging from the tree was of Vinod. The information of which was given to Mul police. The reason behind the hanging is not clear. Maroda Police Patil Rahul Watgure has given information about the incident.

This incident is said to have happened on Sunday morning, 15th. This is the second tragic incident of this week in Maroda. Before this, a murder case had occurred in which the owner had killed his Diwanji.

School director nabbed in Shalarth ID Scam

Nagpur 15 June: The Special Investigation Team (SIT) probing the Shalarth ID scam in the education department on Saturday arrested Dilip Dhote, the director of a prominent school at Mohpa, Kalmeshwar. The arrest follows an extensive interrogation and investigation into the scam, which caused significant financial losses to the state exchequer. According to official sources, Dhote allegedly bypassed the headmaster to create and regularise Shalarth IDs for teachers, enabling unauthorised appointments. He is accused of facilitating the recruitment of several teachers using forged documents and approving their salaries and arrears dating back to 2013-14. Additionally, Dhote allegedly transferred these teachers to other schools under his management. Sources said that Dhote allegedly used coercive tactics and threatened to withhold salaries of teachers or staff who opposed his actions. The SIT's probe uncovered evidence of systematic manipulation, prompting swift action against Dhote. The arrest sent shock waves through the local education community, raising concerns about oversight in school administrations. Authorities are investigating to identify other individuals involved in the scam and to assess the full extent of the financial damage. Dhote is currently in custody.



TATR looking beyond safaris

Chandrapur 15 June: Tiger Reserve (TATR) is set to transform wildlife tourism in Maharashtra by providing customised 'experiences' in the buffer zone, rather than just the routine hop-and-ride safari. TATR, through a rigorous process, will select a reputable tour operator agency which will be responsible for creating tailor-made experiences for tourists, which goes beyond 'tiger sighting'.

The selected agency will be called "official partner of TATR", a tag the firm can use in its branding and marketing creatives. Prabhu Nath Shukla, field director of (TATR), said the plan will be limited to the buffer zone of the TATR. "Our aim is to provide tourists coming here with a plethora of activities to choose from. Many times, we have tourists who reach directly at the gate, only to find that no safari slots are available. Also, tourists with booked slots have free time in between the morning and evening safaris. This project will give such tourists more options," Shukla said. TATR, through its official partner, will prepare tailor-made itineraries showcasing the buffer area's wildlife, landscapes, and local culture. Each tour package will emphasize eco-friendly practices and intimate wildlife encounters (guided safaris,

birdwatching, nature walks, etc.), heritage walks, apart from religious and scientific exposure visits. TATR wants each visitor to leave with a lasting impression of the destination; one that deeply connects them with its people, places, and unique ethos. "In the buffer zone we have many villages where the local culture can be shown.

There are adventure activities like kayaking and boating which tourists can enjoy. There are many other areas of tourist interest which will be identified, and the official partner will then market it," Shukla added. The project will also provide employment to locals and optimize revenue for the govt. "This will help tourists to explore all gates and surrounding areas. It will help in spreading the tourist load and generate revenue," Shukla said. While the official partner will prepare customized 'tour experiences' and market it to a worldwide audience, TATR management will facilitate necessary logistics, swift permissions, and ensure tourists' safety.

Forest officials are counting on the operator's marketing acumen and TATR's resources, to enhance eco-tourism practices and generate greater awareness and revenues for conservation efforts for the region.

RMH, Maharashtra cops & diplomats blur border for mentally ill woman

Gondia 15 June: A mentally challenged woman in her mid-30s landed in Gondia, 1,600km away from her native village in Noakhali, Bangladesh, under unexplained circumstances. She was rescued by Gondia cops, shifted to Regional Mental Hospital (RMH), Nagpur, treated, and reunited with her family after six years through diplomatic efforts and alacrity shown by Nagpur police. The remarkable reunion of the woman, Mona (name changed), with her family in Bangladesh materialised on June 12. RMH, police & diplomats blur border for mentally ill. On April 30, Mona was admitted to RMH by Gondia police. With no identification and only her name to share, she offered few clues about her origin. Under RMH's medical

care, her condition stabilised, allowing her to recall fragments of her past. This sparked a search led by social service superintendent Kunda Bidkar (Katekhaye). Bidkar's attempts to trace Mona's family in Madhya Pradesh yielded no results. Undeterred, she turned to digital tools, using Google, Facebook, and language interpreters, even involving her son to scour social media. Her persistence paid off when she connected with Tapan Prodhan of Ishwar Sankalp Foundation, Kolkata, who collaborated with Shamsul Huda in Bangladesh. Huda verified Mona's address within 15 minutes, confirming she was from Bangladesh and was missing for over six years. Her family, who searched

tirelessly, presumed she was dead. The reunion process required intricate coordination with the High Commission in Delhi and deputy commissioners in Kolkata and Mumbai. "We still don't know how she entered India and landed in Gondia," said Bidkar. Bidkar sought support from Union minister Nitin Gadkari's office and Nagpur district collector Vipin Itankar. The case was referred to the SP, Gondia, with constable Sanjay Badwaik coordinating efforts. On May 13, Mona received a travel permit, marking a critical milestone. After completing immigration formalities at Howrah railway intelligence bureau, Mona was handed over to Border Guard Bangladesh, her brother, and a Bangladeshi NGO.

100 Fall ill due to food poisoning, 34 hospitalised

Bhiwapur 15 June: A wedding celebration in Bhiwapur, in Nagpur district, took a tragic turn on Friday when nearly 100 attendees reportedly suffered food poisoning. According to local officials, 34 people were hospitalised after their condition worsened, while several others sought medical help and were discharged after initial treatment. Of those hospitalised, 30 were admitted to a local hospital in Bhiwapur. Four patients in serious condition were shifted to Government Medical College and Hospital (GMCH) in Nagpur, where doctors confirmed they are currently stable and under

observation. Police said the incident occurred at a wedding function late Friday. Caterers prepared food for the event reportedly between 5am and 9am and left. After that, the food was served around 2pm, during peak heat and humidity.

Later, leftover food was taken home by the bride's family and served again to guests at the evening gathering. "Initial investigation suggests that the food may have become unsafe due to prolonged exposure to high temperatures and poor storage," said a Bhiwapur police official. A case has been registered under BNS Sections 271 and 272 against the bride's father.

Nagpur 15 June: The air traffic control (ATC) tower at Nagpur airport is ready with information about its readiness to meet any emergency, if questioned by the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) in the backdrop of the Ahmedabad incident, said sources.

There is a protocol that follows when a full emergency is declared. The worst case can be a Mayday call by a pilot, which means total distress. The Nagpur ATC is geared up to tackle any such situation, said sources. In case an emergency emerges, an entire mechanism, including fire tenders and ambulances, kicks in on the ground. The ATC's job is also to ensure that no other flight comes in the distressed plane's proximity, a source said.

The airports are supposed to conduct drills to deal with similar situations from time to time. There are

drills for full and partial emergencies, which are held once a year. Mihaan India Limited (MIL), the airport operator has already completed the exercise for Nagpur airport, said a source.

A Mayday call is considered to be the worst situation, and often there is little chance to do anything.

Then there is the Pan-Pan call, which is relayed by a pilot to indicate that there is a danger and the ATC needs to focus on it, a source said. An emergency was faced by Nagpur airport in 2021, when the pilot of a Bangladeshi aircraft suffered a heart attack, and the plane made an emergency landing in the city. It's called 'pilot incapacitation' in aviation terms. The Boeing 737 aircraft was on its way to Dhaka from Muscat when the pilot suffered a heart attack mid-air and slipped into a coma, recalled a source at the airport.

Elevated rotary road option being assessed for Medical Square: Gadkari

Nagpur 15 June: An ambitious project to alleviate traffic woes at the busy Medical Square is being contemplated by Union minister Nitin Gadkari. The Nagpur MP recently said he is ideating upon a project to build an elevated rotary road to help ease the traffic flow. In a brief statement about it, Gadkari said, "At Ashok Chowk, we are planning to construct a signal-less square, like a roundabout rotary. Another thing I have in mind is, Medical Square. To build an elevated road (rotary) there." The Union minister clarified that these are in the conceptualization stage. Regarding the Liberty Square flyover, Gadkari said that the design is faulty, but it will be rectified. "I have already prepared a proposal for Rs 34 crore and it has been sent for clearance. A new design has been readied for it," said Gadkari, while addressing the media on Thursday. The flyover has three landings, one at Katol Road, one at Mankapur and one between LIC Square and RBI Square. It's the landing at the latter section which is being redesigned, and it's likely that another landing might connect on the road going towards LIC Square. At this point Gadkari even called his official from the sidelines and enquired about the status of that file. After speaking with the official, Gadkari said "Work will start soon and the problem will be solved. Giving an update on other flyovers of the city, Gadkari first spoke about the Kadbi Chowk flyover going towards

Mominpura.

"All permissions have been taken and the issue (for delay) is due to encroachment at Mominpura. We have given the work to MahaRail and this will benefit everyone because directly from Mominpura you can connect to Kamptee Road." About the Pachpaoli flyover, Gadkari said, "For the flyover from Kamal Talkies, we are using the latest technology from Malaysia for construction. At Kamal Chowk, we will build a huge market where all vendors will get space." He added that a lot of flyovers have been built or approved for Nagpur, which will ultimately provide succour for traffic movement. In East Nagpur, which has got many flyover projects, Gadkari joked that there is now no space remaining. "MLA Krishna Khopde has got so many projects approved that no space is left vacant.

I told him that only a 2m wide lane remains in one of the localities, and maybe we should construct one flyover here too," said Gadkari.



department material, Covid-era supplies, and equipment seized during anti-encroachment drives. BMW Hit-and-Run incident: Driver booked but not arrested

Victim's family protests outside Beltarodi Police Station

Nagpur 15 June: Public outrage intensified on Saturday, June 14, as the family members of Yogesh Tulsiram Bopche, the 29-year-old labourer killed in the Chinchbhuvan BMW hit-and-run case, staged a protest outside Beltarodi Police Station, demanding the immediate arrest of accused Avantikumar Kothari. Kothari, the owner of the BMW (HP 89 A 1592) that fatally knocked down Bopche in the early hours of June 9, was traced and booked by police on Friday, June 13. However, citing technicalities in a Supreme Court judgment, Beltarodi police have not arrested him, triggering strong backlash from the victim's family and local residents. According to police, Kothari, a resident of Darodkar Square, Central Avenue, had purchased the luxury vehicle from a Mumbai-based car dealer, Shahrukh Tahir Khan. After the incident, Kothari reportedly fled Nagpur with his family and switched off his mobile phone. Investigators were eventually able to track him using the call detail records (CDR) of an



alternate number. The fatal crash occurred around 3 am on June 9 (Sunday) near Chinchbhuvan Square. The BMW, allegedly driven at high speed, hit Yogesh Bopche and his relative Bhojendra Khobragade (55), residents of Jagdish Nagar, Gittikhadan, as they were walking along the road. While Bopche succumbed to his injuries at AIIMS, Khobragade remains in critical condition. Eyewitnesses said the vehicle sped away after the crash but stopped a short distance ahead after a tyre burst. The driver abandoned the vehicle and fled. Locals

who reached the car reported liquor bottles inside the cabin, raising suspicion of drunken driving. Bopche's death has left his family devastated. He was the sole earning member, and is survived by his wife and two sons — Chirag (5) and Kiyan (5 months). Despite registering a case and tracing the accused, the police's delay in arresting Kothari has sparked criticism, with citizens accusing authorities of going soft on the rich and influential. Protesters on Saturday demanded justice and immediate legal action, warning of intensified agitation if the police failed to act decisively.

The warehouse contained cold fire pyros, halogen lights, and electrical decor items, and the blaze reportedly started during welding work.

Residents demand closure of road divider near Pratap Nagar misused to bypass signal, cite safety threat

Nagpur 15 June: Residents of Ganesh Colony and Shyam Nagar, located near the Pratap Nagar area, have urged the Nagpur Municipal Corporation (NMC) and local police to immediately shut a road divider near the Rana Pratap Nagar Chowk police outpost. They allege that the open divider is being exploited by commuters to dodge the Pratap Nagar traffic signal, creating hazardous conditions in their residential neighborhoods. According to locals, heavy traffic—including sand and gravel-laden trucks and school buses—routinely cuts through the colonies to avoid waiting at the signal. This diversion has led to a series of daily minor accidents and significantly raised the risk of serious incidents, especially with houses closely facing each other and children frequently playing near the gates. Despite repeated complaints submitted to civic and traffic authorities, no corrective measures have been implemented so far, residents claim. They also highlighted the issue of a popular tea stall adjacent to the Pratap Nagar police outpost, which draws patrons who park haphazardly on the road, worsening congestion. Additionally, vehicles from the nearby junction are often parked within the colonies, obstructing both pedestrians and local traffic. Frustrated by the inaction, residents have now issued a warning: if the road divider is not closed promptly to prevent further danger, they will be compelled to stage a protest.

Garbage collection resumes in Nagpur after AG Enviro strike ends

The protest was withdrawn following the company's disbursement of Rs 1.33 crore towards pending leave encashment dues. The sanitation workers had halted door-to-door garbage collection on Friday, citing delays in leave encashment and alleging financial and mental harassment. After a round of negotiations, the management addressed their concerns, leading to the resolution of the strike. AG Enviro Project Head, Dr. Sameer Tonpe, denied allegations of irregular salary disbursement, stating that employees are consistently



paid by the 15th of each month. This month's salaries were credited on June 11, he added. Tonpe acknowledged occasional minor delays due to calculation issues but maintained that payments are generally on time. Addressing the demands made during the strike, Dr. Tonpe claimed that some employees had sought leave encashment for 58 days—well beyond government-mandated limits. He also accused certain staff members of misconduct, including diesel theft, unauthorized scrap sales, and reporting to work under the influence of alcohol.

Nagpur girl critically injured in Zipline mishap in Manali, Kin allege negligence

Nagpur 15 June: A summer vacation turned tragic for a Nagpur-based family when 13-year-old Trisha Bijwe sustained severe injuries after falling from a zipline in Manali on June 8. The incident has sparked public outrage and raised serious questions about the safety protocols at adventure tourism sites in Himachal Pradesh. Trisha was holidaying with her parents, Prafulla Bijwe and his wife, when the accident occurred. According to eyewitnesses and family accounts, the zipline cable reportedly snapped mid-air, causing Trisha to plummet nearly 30 feet to the ground. She suffered multiple fractures in her legs and other injuries due to the impact. Initially taken to a local hospital in Manali, Trisha was later shifted to a specialized care. She is now admitted to a private hospital in Nagpur, where she remains under close medical observation. The Bijwe family has blamed



the zipline operators for serious lapses in safety and alleged that there was no immediate emergency response at the site. "There were no harness checks, no medical staff on standby, and no proper supervision," said Prafulla Bijwe. The family has also released a video of the incident, capturing the fall and the chaotic aftermath, which has since gone viral. The incident has triggered widespread condemnation,

with citizens and safety advocates demanding strict regulatory oversight of adventure tourism operators. The family is calling for a thorough investigation into the matter and strict accountability for those found negligent. Authorities in Himachal Pradesh have yet to issue an official statement, but pressure is mounting for immediate action and tighter safety enforcement across all adventure activity zones.

Mcap of eight of top-10 most valued firms erodes by Rs 1.65 lakh crore

Mumbai 15 June: The combined market valuation of eight of the top-10 most valued firms eroded by Rs 1,65,501.49 crore last week, with HDFC Bank taking the biggest hit, in-line with a bearish trend in domestic equities. Last week, the BSE benchmark tanked 1,070.39 points or 1.30 per cent. While Tata Consultancy Services (TCS) and Infosys witnessed net addition in their market valuations, Reliance Industries, HDFC Bank, Bharti Airtel, ICICI Bank, State Bank of India, Life Insurance Corporation of India (LIC), Bajaj Finance and Hindustan Unilever Ltd faced erosion. The valuation of HDFC Bank tanked by Rs 47,075.97 crore to Rs 14,68,777.88 crore. The market capitalisation (mcap) of ICICI Bank tumbled Rs 30,677.44 crore to Rs 10,10,375.63 crore. The valuation of Reliance Industries dropped by Rs 21,516.63 crore to Rs 19,31,963.46 crore and that of State Bank of India eroded by Rs 18,250.85 crore to Rs 7,07,186.89 crore. The mcap of Hindustan Unilever Ltd dived by Rs 16,388.4 crore to Rs 5,44,893.71 crore. Bharti Airtel's valuation declined by Rs 15,481.22 crore to Rs 10,50,413.33 crore and that of LIC went lower by Rs 13,693.62 crore to Rs 5,93,379.66 crore. The mcap of Bajaj Finance dipped Rs 2,417.36 crore to Rs 5,80,052.09 crore. However, the market valuation of TCS jumped Rs 22,215.06 crore to Rs 12,47,190.95 crore and the mcap of Infosys climbed Rs 15,578.3 crore to Rs 6,65,318.03 crore. In the top-10 list, Reliance Industries Ltd remained the most valued firm followed by HDFC Bank, TCS, Bharti Airtel, ICICI Bank, State Bank of India, Infosys, LIC, Bajaj Finance and Hindustan Unilever Ltd.

Sewa, the ethos of selfless service

Chhabeels serving cool, sweetened waterto passersby is a welcome sight in summer. A few weeks back was the martyrdom day of Guru Arjan. The fifth Guru was tortured to death in Lahore on May 30, 1606. Like on other events of importance to the community, this time, too, chhabeels sprang up all over, serving a delicious blend of milk, rose syrup and water, with a dash of kewra or some other variation. What is impressive is the commitment to service among those who prepare and serve the drink, standing under the sun, beseeching strangers to partake of the drink. Sewa extends beyond the action itself. It is a spiritual practice that transcends boundaries and fosters a sense of unity with fellow beings — those who perform sewa seek nothing for their service other than the grace of God. Sewa is central to the Sikh ethos, and we often see it in the form of langar. The profoundly spiritual experience is rooted in the teachings of the Gurus. As Guru Arjan, who compiled the Adi Granth, says in Sukhmani Sahib: "Sewa karat hoye nehkami tis ko prapat hot swami. (One who serves selflessly, without thought of reward, obtains the Lord)". (Guru Granth Sahib, p 286). The Gurus were conscious of the inherent capacity for connection that human beings have and the compassion that's there in all of us. They wove it into the Sikh ethos, showing us the path of sewa, which is much more than the notion of charity. Sewa is a spiritual discipline inculcated on the

path to the Divine. Sewa can be of three types: Tan, Mann, and Dhan. We have often seen people using the expression together — thereby stating that they will serve physically, mentally, and by utilising the resources and wealth they have. It is not that a Sikh can choose to focus on one or the other; all have to be performed for those in need. Of course, some are better equipped for particular tasks, and thus, it is only prudent that they perform sewa that suits their talents and helps those who need it. Indeed, the expanding services in gurdwaras, which now include counselling, medical and educational facilities, among others, show the evolving forms of sewa. Spiritual masters have long recognised the importance of performing charity. All religions lay stress on it. Hinduism emphasises serving the poor and acts of charity towards the needy. In Christianity, we see the imperative "Love thy neighbour as thyself" and the practice of giving tithe to charity.

In Islam, the welfare of the community and the needy is undertaken according to the directives of zakat and sadaqah, both acts of charity: the former is obligatory, and the latter voluntary. Buddhist monks lead their followers in community service, guided by karuna and metta, which translate into compassion and kindness, respectively. A powerful memory I carry in my mind is from decades ago, of karsewa at Harmandir Sahib, where people had gathered to desilt the Amrit Sarovar.

Getting short end of the stick, butt it's fine

Baba Ramdev's recent video about starting a 'sherbet jihad' against (presumably) the iconic Rooh Afza reminded me of a jihad that has been raging for some time now but hasn't got the attention it deserves. I refer to the "cigarette jihad" against smokers, which is far more ubiquitous than the other jihads: the latter are limited in scope, applicable only to members of certain religions, but the "cigarette jihad" applies across the board to everyone who smokes, irrespective of his or her religion, and is a shocking display of secularism, in my view. No one but a smoker understands fully the import of the saying: you can run but you can't hide. For a smoker today, there's no place to hide (and have a quiet puff) — he is banished from restaurants, cinema halls, buses and metros, drawing rooms, planes and airports, and even in his own castle he has to take refuge in either a toilet or a balcony. His social status is lower than that of a Punjabi or Gujarati immigrant in Trump's America. Doctors talk down to him, Finance Ministers treat him like a milch cow, hotels consign him to smoking rooms without any room service, airport managers shove him into smoking cubicles resembling tandors, socialites turn up their rump at him with a founce, pretty girls refuse to share their mobile numbers with him. In Washington for a World Bank meeting, I had to go down 30 floors, out in the freezing cold, every time I wished to have a cigarette. Cadging a few million dollars

from the bank certainly wasn't worth the effort. But it wasn't always so for people of my generation. I started smoking in my first year in college and have not looked back since, except to recollect, with a touch of nostalgia the good old days of Clint Eastwood, Marlon Brando and Humphrey Bogart, who always spoke through a cloud of smoke. One could smoke anywhere then — with a cup of coffee at Trinca's on Park Street watching the non-pareil Usha Uthup belting out 'Ramba ho', or in the AC coach while travelling home to Kanpur from Calcutta, or while watching a movie in the Rivoli on Connaught Place. Till the early 1990s, I distinctly remember being allowed to smoke even on international flights, occasionally even being gifted a couple of packs of Marlboros by an air-hostess impressed with my diplomatic passport! (In those days, wrestling federation chiefs didn't get these maroon passports!). Girls didn't exactly swoon over us (that was reserved for the leftists), but they did occasionally cuddle up for a second-hand whiff and that was, as Omar Khayyam would have no doubt said, "Heaven enow." Why, one could even light up during job interviews: I remember being interviewed by the Director Personnel of SBI in the Parliament Street office for the job of a Probationary Officer. I lit up while waiting for my turn; when I was called, I walked in with my cigarette, waste not, want not, being my creed. I didn't get the job, of course, but not because of the lighted

fag. I suspect it had something to do with my answer to the Director's question: "Where do you see yourself five years from now in this bank?" In hindsight, my answer was perhaps too cocky: "In your chair, sir." I have since learned that honesty is never the best policy at job interviews. Non-smokers are not aware of what they are missing. Cigarettes are the food for broken souls. You can't buy happiness but anyone can buy cigarettes, and that comes pretty close. Oscar Wilde famously said 'a cigarette is the perfect type of a perfect pleasure. It is exquisite, and it leaves one unsatisfied. What more can one want?' Groucho Marx went a step further when he stated that, given the choice between a woman and a cigar, he would always choose the cigar. At the age of 74, I see the wisdom in what he said: it's easier now to light up a cigarette than a woman. There are other benefits too: smoking is the perfect way to commit suicide without actually dying, and therefore it obviates the need for having to save up for your old age! One final thought. Cigarettes, or at least the buying of them, is a very accurate indicator of inflation, certainly much better than the consumption "basket" government economists are talking about all the time. This basket, of course, is rigged like a casino. But a smoker never lies. I started my smoking career in the early '70s with the humble beedi (which cost about 25 paise for a pack of 10) since my Dad gave me a pocket money of Rs 10 per month only.

Inflation falls, but don't lower the guard

India's retail inflation, as measured by the Consumer Price Index (CPI), dropped sharply to 2.82 percent in May 2025. This is its lowest level in over six years. The dramatic cooling, primarily driven by easing food prices, is a welcome reprieve for consumers, especially those in the lower income brackets who spend a large share of their budgets on food.



The sharp contraction in prices of vegetables (-13.7 per cent), pulses

(-8.2 per cent), spices and meat has been central to this trend.

Food and beverages inflation dropped to 1.5 per cent, marking the seventh consecutive month of moderation.

However, this relief is partial. Inflation in edible oils surged into double digits, driven by global price trends, reduced oilseed sowing and India's heavy dependence on imports. Fruits, too, saw price spikes. The government's move to halve the import duty on crude edible oils is a timely measure, but its impact will take time to reflect.

Imtiaz-Diljit team up again

Rana Naidu Season 2: A gritty family drama fueled by revenge and redemption

Mumbai 15 June: Rana Naidu Season 2 picks up right where it left off — with chaos, high-stakes drama, and a fixer who just can't seem to escape his past. This time, Rana (Rana Daggubati) tries to settle into a quieter life with his wife Naina (Surveen Chawla), but is quickly dragged back into the underworld when his son is kidnapped. What follows is a web of deceit, double-crosses, and unexpected alliances as he takes on dangerous foes — including a vengeful gangster Raul (Rajat Kapoor) and a manipulative new boss, Viraj Oberoi (Arjun Rampal). The season retains its gritty tone and fast-paced narrative, weaving through personal betrayals, family breakdowns, and corporate politics. The heart of the show remains the strained relationship between Rana and his eccentric, volatile father Naga (Venkatesh Daggubati), which continues to deliver both tension and dark humour. The Goa track and the family fallout add new layers to the characters, while side plots like Naina's emotional drift and Tej's move to Portugal deepen the drama. Performance-wise, Rana and Venkatesh are in top form — subtle and intense, they command every scene. Surveen Chawla and Kriti Kharbanda are solid, and Arjun Rampal is a menacing presence as the antagonist. However, some characters are poorly developed or abruptly written off, which hurts the narrative flow. There are moments of clever tension and well-executed twists, but the writing often leans on convenience, and some dramatic build-ups fizzle out without resolution. While Rana Naidu 2 tries to go bigger and darker, it sometimes loses focus in trying to do too much. Still, fans of the series will find enough to stay invested — from stylish action sequences to emotionally charged confrontations. Verdict: A watchable sequel that delivers strong performances and gripping moments, though let down at times by clunky storytelling and underdeveloped subplots. It's messy, but entertaining.

‘Digital Wellness: Stabilise Your Mind to Utilise Your Brain’ workshop held at VNIT

Nagpur 15 June: Calling out the excessive dependence on digital screens as a ‘silent epidemic’, VNIT director Premal Patel recently said ‘digital obesity’ is emerging as a serious threat to students’ mental stability and academic performance. He was speaking at a workshop titled ‘Digital Wellness: Stabilise Your Mind to Utilise Your Brain’, held on the VNIT campus in association with the Brahmapuram. “From the moment students wake up to when they sleep, their minds



are constantly wired, emotional instability, and unchecked screen exposure is leading to cognitive fatigue, declining classroom performance,” Patel said. He

cautioned against night-time phone use and doom-scrolling, which, he added, was eroding students’ attention spans and overall well-being. To counter this trend, VNIT launched the Rajyoga Thought Lab, the first of its kind at the institute. “We have labs for machines, materials, and equations — but none for the mind. That needs to change,” Patel asserted. The lab will focus on thought management, guided journaling, meditation, and other techniques to help students

build emotional resilience. The event was inaugurated by BK Rajni Didi in the presence of Mukesh Agrawal, Ratnes Kumar, and BK Bala Kishore, a digital wellness expert who underlined the importance of integrating thought training into mainstream education. Supporting Patel’s views, VNIT dean of student welfare Ratnes Kumar said students are increasingly facing stress and attention issues, necessitating structured, science-backed mental health interventions.

‘Red market’ might thrive if extent of voluntary blood donation diminishes

Nagpur 15 June: As the world observes World Blood Donor Day 2025 under the theme “Give blood, give hope: Together we save lives,” Maharashtra’s health minister, Prakash Abitkar, directed officials to urgently implement a “No Shortage, No Wastage” policy. The policy aims to ensure timely access to safe blood for patients while also curbing avoidable wastage due to poor coordination. “Blood is a national resource, and its collection, storage, and use must be meticulously managed,” said Abitkar during a state-level review of blood services. He noted that seasonal imbalances, such as massive blood collection during national events or birthdays of politicians, often contrast with shortfalls during festivals and summer, creating a mismatch in supply

and demand. He directed health authorities to design and submit a comprehensive policy immediately. The state govt also plans to introduce new rules for granting NOCs to blood bank operators and explore NAT (Nucleic Acid Testing) in govt blood banks for higher safety. Meanwhile, Dr Sunil Khaparde, former director of NACO and now a city-based national expert on blood safety, raised alarm over India’s growing dependence on paid or professional donors, despite legal bans. “With a demand of 1.2 crore units annually, we still fall short by over 30 lakh units. The deficit often drives patients to the underground ‘Red Market,’ where ethics and safety are routinely compromised,” said Dr Khaparde. He stressed that while portals like e-RaktKosh and

govt campaigns have made strides, the absence of a centralized national blood collection agency is keenly felt. “Even today, much of our blood supply comes from professional donors or family replacements. Genuine voluntary donation remains under 50%,” he noted. Dr Harish Warbhe, medical director of Lifeline Blood Centre in the city, emphasized the health benefits of voluntary donation even for the donors themselves. “Regular voluntary blood donation not only saves lives but also stimulates the donor’s bone marrow to produce fresh, healthier blood cells. It reduces iron overload in the body and gives a sense of purpose and community connection. It’s a simple act with profound benefits — for recipients and donors alike,” he said.

HRS Hikers complete physically demanding trek to Kedarnath Temple

Nagpur 15 June: A group of 15 individuals under the banner of HRS Hikers completed a spiritually and physically demanding expedition to Kedarnath Temple on foot. Starting from Sonprayag, the group undertook the 23km uphill journey to the Kedarnath Temple, one of the holiest shrines nestled in the Garhwal Himalayas. Despite the formidable terrain and altitude challenges, every member reached the temple without the aid of ponies or palanquins — a feat made more inspiring by the fact that 9 of the trekkers were aged between 53 and 61 years. The group comprised: Radhakrishna Picipaty, Sita Krishna Picipaty, Sonam Jaiswal, Sanjay Singh, Reena Singh, Jyothi Naidu, Bhaskar Naidu, Meeta Shaw,



Sara Pekhale, Jaidev Wavre, Aaryan Sonawane, Y Vijaya, Y Sriya, Y Sneha, and Kavitha Shinde. The journey was expertly led by Rohit Pisipati & Harshit Jaini, whose leadership and meticulous planning were instrumental in the group’s success. Wild elephant kills elderly man in forest

Sindewahi June 15 (NAGPUR POST/TC): A 70-year-old man was killed by a wild elephant in a forest in Maharashtra’s Chandrapur district on Sunday, June 15. The attack took place in the Jatlapur area in Sindewahi in the early hours of the day. The official said this is the first incident of an elephant attack recorded in the district. A herd of elephants from Odisha entered the forests of Gadchiroli through Chhattisgarh and it was spotted in the Saoli forest area of Chandrapur district. According to reports, two



elephants entered the Asolamendha area of the Saoli forest and crossed the Wainganga River, reached the Sindewahi forest area. The Victim, a 70-year-old Maroti Masram, entered the forest to attend to nature’s call when he was attacked and killed by the angry jumbo. The official recovered his body and sent it to a government hospital for a post-mortem. The police have launched the probe.

Indian Constitution is a living, organic, evolving document: CJI

Nagpur 15 June: Chief Justice of India Justice Bhushan Gavai, delivering an address at Edinburgh Law School recently, described the Indian Constitution as a “living, organic, evolving document” that has consistently adapted to the nation’s shifting socio-political realities, often through dynamic engagement between Parliament and judiciary. The speech, titled ‘Constitution as an Evolving Document’, offered a rich historical and legal analysis of constitutional transformation across 75 years of India’s democracy. Justice Gavai highlighted that Constitution drafters themselves anticipated the need for change overtime. “Dr Ambedkar rightly said we cannot bind future generations to the Constitution we adopt today. It must evolve with time,” he said, citing Ambedkar’s reply to critics during the Constituent Assembly debates on 25 November 1949. The newly appointed CJI traced how early court rulings prompted immediate constitutional amendments. One such example was the 1951 First Amendment, necessitated by judicial setbacks to backward class reservations and free speech restrictions. This amendment, signed by Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru, added Article 15(4) to empower the state to provide for marginalised sections and revised Article 19 to allow for speech-related restrictions concerning public order, state security, and international relations. Justice Gavai elaborated on the evolution of the amending power under Article 368. He cited Shankari Prasad (1951) and Sajjan Singh (1965), where Parliament’s amending power was upheld, but noted that dissenting opinions — particularly by Justice Mudholkar — laid the groundwork for the Basic Structure Doctrine. This culminated in the historic 1973 Kesavananda Bharati verdict, where a 13-judge bench held that while Parliament could amend the Constitution, it could not alter its fundamental framework. “Justice H R Khanna’s balancing view, supported by both sides, became the



law,” he said. He also referred to the 42nd and 44th amendments, the former inserting “socialist” and “secular” into the Preamble and restricting judicial review, and the latter restoring checks on Emergency powers post-1977. He noted how Minerva Mills reaffirmed judicial review as part of the basic structure. Justice Gavai went on to describe amendments driven by social justice, including Article 16(4A) for reservation in promotions following Indra Sawhney, and Article 21A introduced by the 86th Amendment for free and compulsory education. He spoke on the 10th Schedule to address defections, and 73rd and 74th amendments to empower rural and urban local govt, as envisioned by Mahatma Gandhi. He also referenced the more recent 103rd Amendment providing reservation for economically weaker sections, and the 106th Amendment reserving one-third seats for women in Parliament and state legislatures — though pending implementation post-delimitation. “Every major constitutional moment, whether from social movements, court judgments or political shifts, has contributed to shaping a Constitution that is dynamic, not static,” he remarked. The session was attended by Justice Vikram Nath, faculty members, Indian consular officials, and legal scholars. Justice Gavai concluded by stating that the document continues to be relevant because “it breathes through interpretation and legislation.”

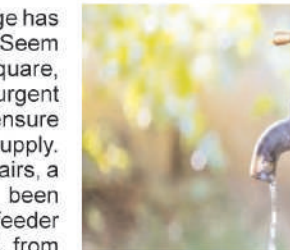

Sitting in big pothole, Kiran Thakre stages agitation in Deoli

Deoli 15 June (NAGPUR POST/TC): Kiran Thakre, President of the Yuva Sangharsh Morcha, sat inside a large pothole on the Deoli-Dighi-Bopapur road for four hours to demand urgent repairing of the road. The protest highlighted the long-pending demand of the road construction which has remained in poor and broken condition for over three years. The state transport bus service to Dighi village has been suspended due to the hazardous road, causing immense hardship to students, farmers, workers, and daily commuters. Adding to their woes, a bridge under construction on the

same route has remained incomplete for over a year. Despite repeated complaints from locals, the Public Works Department (PWD) did not pay attention towards this demand. Sand smuggling going on unabated from Ghatkuroda Ghat

Tirora 15 June (NAGPUR POST/CHITRA KAPSE): Sand smuggling is going on unabated and is taking place on a large scale in the taluka and due to the government's indifferent policy and administration's negligent attitude, public property of the people is being damaged & compromised to a large extent. It seems that no one is sensitive about this issue as the sand smugglers are secretly getting financial benefits. A detailed report which has come to the fore regarding this issue is that on June 12, while the Tirora police were on patrol at night, according to confidential information received by the police inspector of the police station, Amit Wankhade, it was found that illegal sand was being transported by dredging it with the help of JCBs in Wainganga riverbed at Ghatkuroda. Upon receiving this information, Police Inspector Amit Wankhade along with his team of police officials and personnel, Assistant Police Inspector Sanjay Kawade, Driver Police Constable Kore, Police Constable Sanju Bante, Police Constable Amit Gaikwad, Driver Police Constable Tembhurnikar, Police Constable Shailesh Damahe, Police Constable Ambade, Police Constable Patle, Driver Police Constable Ilme were going to the Ghatkuroda riverbed when a white swift vehicle MH



35AR 7703 was intercepted in front of them. The driver and owner of the vehicle warned the tractor and JCB drivers to run away. The vehicle disappeared from there. After giving a warning, the tractor drivers dumped the sand in the tractor into the riverbed and drove the tractor towards Ghatkuroda. When the police personnel chased them and caught 7 tractors and 1 JCB, the tractor drivers left their tractors and fled to Ghatkuroda riverbed. The tractor and JCB in their possession were seized.

Rs 42 lakh worth material confiscated
The tractor driver, owner, yellow JCB driver and shift vehicle No. MH 35 AR 7703 driver and owner have helped in illegal transportation of sand, so a written complaint has been filed by the government authorities under Section 112.305(d) of BNS 2023 against them. Sand smugglers have been stealing sand on a large scale by illegally extracting sand from this sand ghat for the past several years. It is being perceived that illegal sand

mining worth crores of rupees is being carried out here. When the river bed was inspected, it was found that approximately 4 to 5 thousand brass of sand has been extracted for the last 4-5 months. The amount of government-owned mineral and sand worth lakhs of rupees stolen from the concerned riverbed and sold through tippers should be measured by assessing the dimensions of the actual riverbed and the follow up action should be taken accordingly.

The cost of the stolen sand per brass in Tirora taluka is Rs. 2540. Action is also expected against the village leaders who are leaving no stone unturned to have their share of the pie and revenue officials who are colluding with them. Did the police patil of Mouja Ghatkuroda ever write to his superiors about the illegal theft and sale of sand? If so, what action was taken by his senior officials? A demand for a thorough investigation into this entire racket is also being raised by the local public.

Road stretch in front of SDO office in pathetic condition

Tirora 15 June (NAGPUR POST/TC): The development of the country largely depends on the development of road infrastructure, so that the citizens do not have to face any trouble in commuting and the government has built several road networks under many schemes. However, the contractors to whom the government gives contracts for building roads are building poor quality roads, as the cement road stretch being built under the Urban Amenities Scheme in front of the Tirora Sub-Divisional Office is allegedly of poor quality. The road stretch in front of the Tirora Sub-Divisional Office was cracked, so a new road stretch's construction has been started there. But it is also true that the contractor has put mortar on that road, but without pouring water on that mortar and without pressing it with a roller, he started building the road on the stretch. Information in this concern was given to the Junior Engineer of Municipal Council Tirora, but it seems that he has not taken any action on the issue so far. However, there is speculation among the



people that the authorities from the concerned department should inspect the road stretch and their payments should be stopped.

I will personally go to the place where the road stretch is being built and inspect it. I will ask the concerned contractor to ensure that the road stretch is being built in state of the art and is of excellent quality.

Youth ends life by hanging himself in a farm in Tekari

Sindewahi 15 June: In Tekri village of Sindewahi tehsil, an incident of a youth committing suicide by hanging himself in a farm came to light on Sunday (15 June). According to the information received, Rishi Rajendra Chauke (29) resident of Tekari, which comes under the jurisdiction of Police Station Sindewahi, woke up from his house at 3 am in the morning and went to Pramod Jagannath Agade's farm to commit suicide by hanging himself with a nylon string tied to a bitter Neem tree. The incident came to light at 7 am. As soon as the information about the incident was received by Police Station Sindewahi, personnel and officials reached the spot. The cops conducted a Panchnama of the dead body and sent the dead body to the rural hospital Sindewahi for sake of postmortem. The reason behind taking the extreme step could not be ascertained as yet. Sindewahi Police is conducting further investigation into the incident after registering a case.



Guguldoth gets status of Gram Panchayat

Ramtek 15 June (NAGPUR POST/TC): As per the directive issued by the Rural Development Department recently, Guguldoth has been declared as a separate revenue village and Panchala Gram Panchayat too has been declared as a separate revenue village. This accomplishment has been achieved due to the efforts of Ramtek legislative assembly constituency legislator and State Minister Adv Ashish Jaiswal. This has created an atmosphere of joy among the villagers. After seven years, the demand of the citizens of Guguldoth in Ramtek tehsil has been fulfilled. By dividing Panchala (Bu) Gram Panchayat, Guguldoth has now been made a separate Gram Panchayat. After the dissolution of the Gram Panchayat has taken place, the administrator will look after its affairs. After the Gram Panchayat elections, the administration will go to the hands of the people's representatives. The then ZP member Shobha Zade and Panchala GP Deputy Sarpanch Sanjay Zade were trying to ensure the bifurcation of the Gram Panchayat from the year 2019. There are 157 villages in Ramtek tehsil and all these villages are included in 45 gram panchayats. Guguldoth village is known as a completely tribal dominated village. Currently, the population of this village is around 1300. This village is situated 5 kilometers away from Panchal. There is no solid road to connect the two villages. Due to this, citizens and employees had to cross the forest path every time. Therefore, the Panchala Gram Panchayat had submitted a proposal to the Panchayat Samiti Ramte to divide Panchala (Bu) Gram Panchayat and make Guguldoth a separate Gram Panchayat. Later on, former Zilla Parishad member Sanjay Zade continuously followed up on this issue. Finally, due to the efforts of Minister of State, Adv Ashish Jaiswal, a directive has been issued to separate Guguldoth Gram Panchayat. Many villages are situated in remote areas in Ramtek taluka. Many of these villages are covered by dense forests. Among these, the villages of Kandri, Kandri Mine, Bothia-Palora, Pawani, Umri, Mangli, Gudegaon, Mahadula, Lohara, and Ghotitok are also in the waiting list as far as becoming separate Gram Panchayats is concerned.

Elderly woman done to death

Rajura 15 June: A spine-chilling incident has come to light in the taluka. An unidentified person stabbed a 55-year-old woman to death with a sharp weapon in Rajura town of Chandrapur district. The deceased has been identified as Kavita Raipure (55), a resident of Ramabai Nagar ward of Rajura town. On the night of June 14, the deceased woman was alone at home, the front gate of her house was locked. On the morning of June 15, her daughter who lives in the vicinity called her mother, but she did not respond. Rajura police was informed about this incident. When the police personnel opened the door and entered, the victim Kavita Raipure was lying in a pool of blood. Rajura police have registered a case of murder against an unidentified suspect under sections 332 (B), 103 (1) of BNS.

Citizens facing a lot of trouble due to sewerage network works in Tirora town

Tirora 15 June (NAGPUR POST/TC): With the efforts of MLA Vijay Rahangdale in the local municipal council area, the sewerage scheme related works in Tirora town have been approved and 65 percent of the pipeline work has been completed in a span of 8 months or so since the work started. Since the aim is to complete this work within a period of 18 months, the work is being planned and implemented on a war footing. These works are worth Rs 81.68 crore and these work have been entrusted to the company PL Adke Nashik and their engineers and labourers are working continuously and the Municipal Council Tirora as well as legislator Vijay Rahangdale are keeping a track on the progress of the development works. Precaution is being taken in order to ensure that the citizens do not face any kind of trouble regarding the sewerage network works in Tirora town. In order to take immediate action regarding the inconvenience to the citizens, a meeting was recently convened at Municipal Council office. The Chief Officer of the Municipal Council, Amol Malkar, Water Supply Department Engineer Sachin Meshram, and the main representative of the contractor, Mayur Warotaria were the major attendees in the meeting. Various instructions were given to the contractors on behalf of the Municipal Council



authorities. As per these directives, the citizens should not be inconvenienced and since the onset of monsoon is looming large, instructions were given to stop the excavation work and the contractors were told to repair the road stretch by pouring ballast and gravel in places where the excavation work has been carried out. Accordingly, the representative of the contractor, Mayur Warotaria, gave an assurance that the work will be planned properly and no complaints will be received. Accordingly, it is being observed that the work has been started by pouring gravel.

A special grievance redressal cell has been set up in the Municipal Council office to ensure that the citizens do not suffer due to underground sewer excavation during the monsoon and the head of that cell is Sachin Meshram,

Engineer of the Water Supply Department.

As soon as the complaints of the citizens are received, the Municipal Council will take action in order to resolve them and take into account the quality of the work being done. If the citizens have any problems in this concern, they should contact the Municipal Council's Water Supply Department. The complaint will be completely resolved immediately, said Sachin Meshram, Water Supply Department Engineer Municipal Council Tirora.

The work of repairing the dugout road stretch by filling it with gravel has commenced and all the complaints of the citizens will be resolved immediately.

Commotion prevails during Pension Adalat at proceedings, retirees disappointed

Many teachers presented documents and evidence to highlight the administration's mistakes. Complaints were also coming to the fore that due to the mistakes of the Panchayat Samiti administration, many teachers were receiving demand notices from the Income Tax Department for the last 10 years or so. No concrete answer was given by the administrative officials on this issue either.

On the occasion, Education Extension Officer and Deputy Education Officer in-charge of the Education Department Vijay Kokode, Bhajbhuj of the General Administration Department and Motghare of the Finance Department were present on the dais. However, due to the absence of senior authorities, the retirees angrily alleged that the Pension Adalat was a sheer waste of time & efforts.

Relief for Nagpur family as doctor son survives Ahmedabad plane crash

Nagpur 15 June: A young doctor from Nagpur, Dr Sushant Deshmukh, narrowly escaped death when Air India Flight AI 171 crashed into the hostel premises of B.J. Medical College in Ahmedabad on 12 June. Dr Deshmukh, a medical intern at the college, was present in the building at the time of the tragic incident. The crash, which claimed the lives of over 270 people including dozens on the ground, struck the Atulyam Hostel where many interns were staying. Dr Deshmukh described the terrifying

experience, stating that if the plane had tilted just slightly differently, it could have hit the main hospital building and caused even greater loss of life. Though physically unharmed, he witnessed the hostel engulfed in flames and suffered the trauma of seeing friends and colleagues injured. "It was horrifying. I still can't believe I made it out alive," he said. The hostel has since been sealed by authorities for safety reasons. His mother, Dr Sushama Deshmukh, a well-known gynaecologist in Nagpur, expressed relief that her son



was safe but acknowledged the emotional toll it had taken on him. "He's safe, but shaken. Many of his friends are injured, and he's doing all he can to help," she said. According to the Federation of All India Medical

Association (FAIMA), around 50-60 medical students from the neighbouring hostels were injured and admitted to hospital. Some remain in critical condition, and a resident doctor's wife is among the deceased. FAIMA has appealed to the public for blood donations to assist with ongoing treatment efforts. Authorities continue to investigate the cause of the crash, which has left a deep impact on the medical community and raised questions about aviation safety and emergency preparedness.

Nagpur School Principal, teachers booked for harassing student over unpaid fees

Nagpur 15 June: A private school in Nagpur has come under scrutiny after its principal and several teachers were booked for allegedly harassing a student over unpaid school fees. The incident has sparked concern among parents and education activists, raising questions about the treatment of students in fee-related disputes.

The case was registered following a complaint by the student's family, who alleged that the school staff mentally harassed their child and threatened to withhold her exam results due to pending dues. According to the complaint, the student



was singled out and verbally humiliated, causing emotional distress. Police have booked the school principal and staff under relevant

sections of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS) and the Juvenile Justice Act. An investigation is currently underway. Legal experts and child rights advocates have pointed out that such actions directly violate Supreme Court and Bombay High Court orders, which state that no student should be punished, denied results, or humiliated over non-payment of fees. The law mandates that fee disputes be resolved between schools and parents, without impacting the student's education or dignity. The school has not yet issued an official statement on the matter. Meanwhile, the incident has prompted calls for stricter enforcement of student protection laws in educational institutions.

City residents grappling with frequent power cuts

Nagpur 15 June: People in Nagpur are unhappy as power cuts continue to trouble many parts of the city. Even though the electricity board is doing repair and maintenance work, power is still going off often, sometimes without any warning. Areas like Besa, Pipla, Hudkeshwar, Ayodhya Nagar, and parts of East, South, and North Nagpur are facing regular blackouts. These power cuts are happening during the day and night, making it hard for families to sleep, study, or stay cool in the summer heat. Many students, elderly people, and pregnant women are struggling the most. The Maharashtra State Electricity Distribution Company



Limited (MSEDCL) says the power cuts are happening because of several reasons. These include high demand due to hot weather, damage to underground cables from road work, and problems with old transformers. Sometimes, even a small fault in a cable can lead to a big power failure. Although MSEDCL is trying to fix problems quickly — sometimes in just 30 minutes — residents say there is not

enough information or help when the power goes out. Many complaint calls go unanswered. Recently, BJP leaders and local citizens held a protest at the Hivarinagar power station, asking for better power supply. The Nagpur Municipal Corporation is also facing problems as water supply is being affected due to power cuts at water pumping stations. To help, the authorities are setting up diesel generators at these stations. But residents are asking for better planning, clear updates on power cuts, and quicker repairs. With the rainy season coming soon, people hope the situation improves before it gets worse.

Two teenagers drown in Gorewada lake during outing with friends

Nagpur 15 June: In a tragic incident that unfolded on Friday evening around 4:30 PM, two 18-year-old youths drowned in Gorewada Lake while out partying with friends. The deceased have been identified as Satish Ramraj Deshbhritar and Aniket Dhanraj Badge, both residents of Manavta Nagar. Reports confirm that the two were maternal cousins. According to information provided by Gittikhadan Police, the duo had gone to Gorewada Lake with three friends—Sahil



Kailas Chauri (21), Yash Adesh Uke (17), and Kunal Sudhakar Uke (13)—to celebrate. Some members of the group had reportedly consumed alcohol. None of

them knew how to swim, which is why they initially stayed near the water's edge. During the outing, Sahil, Yash, and Kunal stepped away from the group to take photos on their mobile phones. Meanwhile, Satish and Aniket, allegedly under the influence of alcohol, ventured into the lake. Unable to swim, both began to drown and quickly disappeared beneath the surface. When their friends returned and found only the clothing of the two at the water's edge, they panicked. Hearing their cries for

help, locals rushed to the scene and alerted the Gittikhadan Police. The fire department was immediately contacted, and a rescue operation was launched. The rescue team recovered both bodies from the lake soon after. Police have registered a case of accidental death and begun further investigation. The shocking incident has plunged Manavta Nagar into mourning. Family members and local residents are devastated by the sudden loss of the young boys.

Former corporators, poll aspirants allege decline in services, blame civic authorities

Nagpur 15 June: Former corporators and aspiring candidates have intensified their criticism of the Nagpur Municipal Corporation (NMC) administration. They hold the absence of elected representation over the last three years responsible for the decline in civic services in the city. A day after MLC and former mayor Sandip Joshi flagged the worsening sanitation situation despite NMC having over 7,000 sanitation workers on its payroll, former corporators from across party lines echoed similar concerns. Many said the administrator-led system, in place since March 2022, failed to deliver basic civic services and created a governance vacuum. Former NCP corporator Duneswar Pethi alleged that development work in non-BJP areas was stalled or selectively cleared. "Unless a file was pushed by someone influential in the BJP, it remained pending. Slum and peripheral areas were worst affected. Since the general body was dissolved, there's been no

accountability. People had no voice," Pethi told reporters. Abha Pande, a former independent corporator, said that citizens were left directionless. "Earlier, people could approach corporators even for minor issues. In the last three years, there's been no one to listen to them. Officers are not answerable, and complaints related to sewer lines, garbage collection, and potholes remained pending. This is not how a city should function," she said. Adding to the growing list of voices, Abhijit Jha, a first-time poll aspirant, alleged large-scale corruption during the administrator's tenure. "Public money was misused. Tenders were awarded without transparency. Key services like sewage repair and roadwork were not prioritised. There's a deep nexus between officials and contractors. A detailed probe will reveal the scale of misgovernance," he alleged. Senior BJP leader and former corporator Vijay Zalke also admitted that the absence of elected representatives contributed to growing public anger.

"Irrespective of the party in power, people always look to corporators first. For three years, the administrative system operated without ground-level feedback. This disconnect has hurt the city. It's time an elected body returns so that governance becomes responsive again," he said. All voices, regardless of political affiliation, stressed the urgency of reinstating an elected general body to restore public accountability. "Only corporators understand the pulse of their wards. Administrative rule may work in smaller towns, but Nagpur needs its local representatives back," Pande added. While the state govt has recently initiated the ward redesign process—set to be carried out by a high-powered committee headed by the municipal commissioner—ex-corporators warn that any further delay in civic polls will only deepen public frustration. "The people of Nagpur deserve elected representatives and responsive governance. Civic polls must happen without delay," Pethi said.

Top seed IM Kundu scored 10½ points from 11 rounds to win the title with a clear margin of 1½ points. Second seed FMArun Kataria of Rajasthan and Nagpur youngster Shaunak Badole scored 9 points each and were placed second and third respectively based on their tiebreak scores. Nagpur kid Kushagra Paliwal, Suhan Deshpande of Maharashtra, Nilay Kulkarni of Maharashtra, Arpita Patankar of Gujarat scored 8½ points apiece and were placed from 4th to 7th place according to their tiebreak scores. Kundu got the cash

prize of Rs 51000 and a glittering trophy while Kataria got Rs 31000 as cash prize. Badole pocketed the prize of Rs 26000. Ambazari Lake Hyacinth removal gets massive push

Nagpur 15 June: The Nagpur Municipal Corporation (NMC) has resumed a massive drive to remove water hyacinth which has swamped nearly one-third of the Ambazari lake as part of its flood-



prevention measure and have deployed pochain machines and other equipment. With the civic elections scheduled to be held later this year, flooding could become a major poll issue, especially when memories of the September 23, 2023, floods are still fresh. In case there is a repeat of 9/23 disaster and city areas get inundated, it will hand down a potential ammunition to those aspiring to contest the impending NMC polls to go ballistic against the civic administration and the BJP-ruled state govt. The citizens affected by the 9/23 flood are already unhappy with the slow pace of work like construction of retaining wall along the Nag River. While the officials say the renewed efforts to remove the hyacinth are part of its pre-monsoon preparedness, there could be a political push too to get the drive completed before peak monsoon, said sources. Officials say the thick growth of hyacinth at the

overflow point hindered the smooth discharge of water into downstream drains and the Nag River, leading to backflow and urban flooding, especially during the last monsoon. While the NMC has been periodically removing the weed, experts say the root cause needs long-term scientific intervention. The civic body also sought assistance from the National Environmental Engineering Research Institute (Neeri) to study and control the hyacinth problem. According to officials, water hyacinth — commonly mistaken for water lilies — covered nearly one-third of Ambazari Lake just a few days ago. However, with intensified efforts, tonnes of the invasive aquatic plant are now being extracted daily. The floating mats of hyacinth became a major concern, especially after recent rains, when they were seen drifting into the Nag River and clogging the flow of stormwater.

Contestants ensure AI reality check before plunging into civic body polls

Nagpur 16 June: Artificial Intelligence (AI) can do a lot many things that can help improve efficiency and productivity on individual or organisational level, but can it predict how an aspirant will fare in an election? That's no longer a question, but something that's already being tried and tested. In fact, AI is the latest trend in poll strategy with aspirants seeking "advice" about their chances of winning, before throwing their hat in the ring. Some poll strategy/survey companies are now offering an AI-driven analytics services to prepare a full report on the chances (in percentage) an aspirant has in a particular ward, based on past poll records, political competition, ground surveys and issues which are connecting with people. An aspirant from North Nagpur, who wanted to check his prospects in the upcoming civic body elections, got such a report from a Mumbai-based company. The aspirant told reporters that it was a cost-effective way to get a reality check. "It's like a marriage kundli-matching report," he laughed while explaining the concept. "For less than Rs 3 lakh I get this report which provides me with a neutral view on what my chances are, regardless of what my supporters say or what I feel. This way, I can decide whether or not to spend a lot of money in the entire poll campaign," said the aspirant. This AI generated testing-the-waters report works out best for poll aspirants who are not career politicians, though the data is crucial for every category of aspirant. Successful businessmen and moneybags who are keen to try their luck in politics still keep the 'economic viability' of their new venture in mind. This poll aspirant got journalists in touch with two others who also got the report made, and said "it helps

a lot". One of them said, "The report is very detailed and we got it in Marathi only. A team came down here and did the survey and two weeks later I got the report. The chart showed us which issues are important in the ward and which party is the preferred one. Then there was an advice on what issues I will have to focus on for victory. But my report gave a low chance of me winning, so I am thinking whether or not to contest." Through these poll aspirants, journalists got in touch with the company in Mumbai, which prepared the reports. Speaking on behalf of the company, Chaitanya Wadekar said even before internet came, surveys were being done. "What has changed now is how the data is collected and most importantly — due to advent of AI — how that data is analyzed and presented," Wadekar said. Wadekar said, "AI predictive model becomes better as more data pours in. We feed it with our intensive ground intel, combined with old poll results, demographics, issues etc to get a more detailed response. Our digital AI-driven database also identifies local influencers, be it social media stars, activists, lawyers, community leaders, who each can swing a few hundred or even a thousand votes in favour of the candidate." Poll aspirants also get a dedicated online dashboard, in Marathi too, and at the click of the button they can see a comprehensive interactive report. The third poll aspirant journalists spoke with said, "Everyone enters polls to win, nobody says I am here to lose unless you have an agenda to cut votes. And at the civic body level, candidates have to mostly put up their own funds. So, the more accurate information you can get, the better."

Traffic cops take action on 5124 riders flouting norms



Nagpur 15 June: Traffic cops took action against a total of 5124 riders under various sections of the Motor Vehicles Act and collected a total fine of Rs 4.07 lakh from the erring riders. Under the Bombay Liquor Prohibition Act, 6 suspects have been arrested in 6 cases and material worth Rs 35 thousand was seized from their possession. The Traffic Department has called upon the citizens to keep all the documents related to the vehicle with them while driving. Citizens and commuters have also been advised to abide by traffic rules, failing which fines and other penal action can be imposed upon them.

Climate resilience a far cry for region's districts

Urgent action is the need of the hour

Nagpur 15 June: Climate change is severely impacting most districts in Vidarbha region which has earned the ignominy of farm distress. Farmers in Chandrapur are battling rising heat and pollution. Yavatmal is still stuck in a deadly drought-cotton trap, and Gadchiroli's tribal growers are at a loss for options to stem crop loss. A new study has exposed the growing divide in Vidarbha, revealing how some districts are adapting to climate change, while others are perilously at the mercy of vagaries of nature in the absence of basic support needed to mitigate environmental adversities. The study, conducted by Chaitanya Ashok Adhav, a PhD scholar in agricultural economics and Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Research Fellowship researcher with govt of Maharashtra, brings out the climate resilience dichotomy in Vidarbha. In the absence of urgent, district-wise action, the region could reel under a new fresh wave of agrarian crisis. "Vidarbha is not a

uniform region when it comes to climate preparedness. While districts like Nagpur and Akola are coping better, places like Yavatmal, Gadchiroli and Chandrapur are still in the environmental and economical quagmire," Adhav told reporters. The study, published in the International Journal of Environment and Climate Change, uses a special climate resilience index to measure each district's risk, support systems and ability to recover from climate shocks. As per the research, Nagpur leads the region in climate resilience, thanks to the presence of research institutions, Krishi Vigyan Kendras (KVKs), market access and adoption of drought-tolerant seeds. Many farmers here use precision farming and benefit from post-harvest infrastructure and agro-processing units. But even Nagpur has gaps. "Tribal communities and women farmers in Nagpur's interiors are often excluded from such benefits, necessitating these reach

out across the district," says Adhav. The study identifies three worst-hit districts. Yavatmal, infamous for farm suicides, continues to suffer from droughts, erratic rainfall and over-reliance on cotton monocropping. Govt schemes like PM Fasal Bima Yojana haven't had the desired impact. "Farmers, it seems, have lost faith in the system," says Adhav. In predominantly tribal Gadchiroli where people are largely dependent on forests, the lack of modern irrigation facility, mobile networks and agri-extension services means central schemes like Paramparagat Krishi Vikas Yojana (PKVY) and Mission for Integrated Development of Horticulture (MIDH) never reach them, the study claims. It also points out that coal-rich Chandrapur is poor in sustainable agriculture and extensive mining is only worsening the situation. "Though Chandrapur has roads and infrastructure, the local climate is wreaking havoc which is putting farming communities in danger," Adhav explains. Though the situation in Washim,

Wardha, Gondia and Buldhana districts is not bad, it can't be termed as doing well either. They benefit from access to govt schemes like Kisan Credit Cards (KCC) and PMKSY, but these districts are plagued by problems such as depleting groundwater, small and scattered landholdings, and skewed access — richer farmers benefit more — eventually leading to poor climate resilience, the study states. The research points out that these districts have embraced mixed cropping, integrated farming and agri-digital platforms like e-NAM. In Bhadara, community-led irrigation and better rainfall have helped. Akola and Amravati's research networks are translating into practical help for farmers on the ground, the study says. Adhav urges a district-specific climate action plan, customised to local needs and realities. "This is a crisis we can still manage but requires smart and quick action. We need to fix what's broken before climate disasters become the new normal in Vidarbha," Adhav said.

Animal Husbandry Department should provide medical services at doorstep: Minister Pankaja Munde

Certificates of registration of cowsheds distributed

Amravati 15 June (NAGPUR POST/DC): Due to the efforts of the government, the inclination of farmers towards the animal husbandry sector is increasing by leaps and bounds. The Animal Husbandry Department should take care of the health of these animals. If necessary, the department should provide services at the doorstep for treatment of animals, directed state minister for Animal Husbandry and Environment and Climate Change Pankaja Munde. A review meeting of the Animal Husbandry Department was conducted on Sunday. Dr. YS Wanjari, Dr. Shashikant Kanphade, Dr. Sandeep Ingle, Dr. Shivendra Mahalle, Dr. Sudhir Chaudhar, Dr. Rajendra Pethe, Dr. Dilip Deshmukh and other officials from the Animal Husbandry Department were present on the occasion. Munde said that the health of animals



should be taken care of in a rather robust way. Efforts are being made to set up state of the art laboratories and clinics in the district. Home delivery services should be provided especially at the taluka level. There should be good quality facilities in cowsheds. The cowsheds should be fenced with wire. The animals being admitted into these healthcare facilities should be treated properly. Over 3 thousand cows have been given

subsidy under the Deshi Gai Pariposhan Yojana. Along with this, milching animals are being distributed and trained under Manav Vikas. Data about these animals should be maintained. Also, they should be provided with the necessary assistance. Since milching animals need pasture, fodder should be arranged by taking up work under the Pasture Development Programme. 217 Beneficiaries have been provided benefits under the

Mahamesh Scheme. Special attention should be paid to this issue.

On the occasion, the certificate of cowshed registration were distributed in a symbolic manner by minister Munde. After this, she took stock of the progress of schemes run by the Environment Department. The sewage treatment system in the areas under the jurisdiction of the civic body should be handled efficiently. The

relevant department should be advised to set up a water treatment centre, mainly in the urban areas. The relevant civic bodies should be asked to make arrangements to collect the water required for sewage treatment in the region. Complaints of air and water pollution are being received as far as industrial installations are concerned. The concerned authorities should take immediate cognisance of these complaints and appropriate measures should be taken in this regard.

There is a thriving textile industry in Amravati. The sewage treatment system here should be checked. There are complaints coming to the fore about air pollution emanating from local power generation plants. Therefore, minister Munde directed that the disposal of ash and sewage generated from these projects should be planned out in an effective manner.

Kin of elderly man who perished in tiger attack given Rs 5 lakh financial assistance

Legislator Kewalram Kale gives cheque to tiger attack victim's family



Churani 15 June (NAGPUR POST/TC): The Forest Department has provided financial assistance of Rs 5 lakh to Harisal based family of Mannu Babla Jawarkar (60), who is a victim of a recent tiger attack in the area. On behalf of the government, apart from rendering financial assistance, it is also necessary to provide psychological support to the family members of tiger attack victims. The Forest Department should implement effective measures to prevent such incidents from recurring,' he said.

The legislator also expressed the view that modern methods should be used to control the movement of wild animals in villages in the vicinity of forest areas. Measures for enhanced public awareness and protection should also be implemented. Although this assistance has brought some relief to Jawarkar family, this incident has once again highlighted the need for immediate implementation of long-term measures to prevent or minimise man-animal conflict.
