Ex-Maha minister Mahadeorao Shivankar passes away at 85

Gondia 20 October: Former minister and veteran BJP leader Mahadeorao Sukhaji Shivankar died after a prolonged illness in Maharashtra's Gondia district on Monday, family sources said.

INS Vikrant gave Pak sleepless nights, says PM while celebrating Diwali with Navy

Mumbai 20 October: Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Monday praised the Navy aboard INS Vikrant, saying the warship gave sleepless nights to Pakistan during Operation Sindoor. He said he felt fortunate to celebrate Diwali this year among Navy personnel aboard the indigenous aircraft carrier off the coast of Goa and Karwar. "INS Vikrant reflects the capability of India's armed forces. Its very name gave Pakistan sleepless nights during Operation Sindoor," the Prime Minister said, adding that it was not just a warship, but a testimony to 21st-century India's hard work,



talent, impact and commitment. "INS Vikrant is a name that shatters the enemy's courage even before a battle begins. This is the power of INS Vikrant," he stressed. In the wake of the April 22 Pahalgam terror attacks, the Navy was placed on high alert in the Arabian Sea, prompting Pakistan to issue warnings amid fears of a possible naval strike. At the heart of the deployment was INS Vikrant, accompanied by 8 to 10 warships. This deployment marked one of the Indian Navy's largest real-time operational movements outside routine peacetime exercises.



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War of Words Erupts Between OBC stalwarts Bhujbal & Wadettiwar Over Maratha Quota

Nagpur 20 October: A political slugfest erupted between Maharashtra's two OBC stalwarts, minister Chhagan Bhujbal and Congress legislative party leader Vijay Wadettiwar, over the contentious Maratha-OBC reservation issue. The exchange came days after a massive OBC rally in Nagpur, with Wadettiwar on Saturday alleging BJP "deplayed" Bhujbal to target him for his role in the successful protest. During his Beed rally on Friday, Bhujbal displayed a video of Wadettiwar sitting with Maratha reservation spearhead Manoj Jarange and demanding Kunbi certificates for eligible Maratha citizens.

He accused Wadettiwar of changing his stand multiple times. "If you continue to act like this, it will affect the OBC community's prospects," he said in the meeting. Speaking to the media in Chandrapur's Brahmapuri town on Saturday, Wadettiwar said, "Bhujbal is a senior leader, and I have never spoken



against him. But he has targeted me in the Beed rally. Earlier, it was Jarange, now it's Bhujbal. If this helps resolve community issues, I'll be happy." He accused BJP of using Bhujbal to deflect criticism from the govt's handling of the reservation controversy. Wadettiwar reiterated the September 2 govt resolution (GR), which allows broader issuance of Kunbi caste certificates based on the Hyderabad Gazette, was "dangerous" for OBC interests. "Earlier, only selected records were valid, but now certificates are being issued indiscriminately after removing the word 'eligible' from the order. This GR must be

revoked immediately by the ministers, including Bhujbal, Chandrashekhar Bawankule, Pankaja Munde, and Atul Save," he said. Congress legislature party leader also condemned the use of violent rhetoric at a previous rally in Ambad in Marathwada. "When people talk of sickles and swords, it's not democracy. Violence can never solve social issues.

This govt is pitting one community against another — Marathas versus OBCs, Dhangers versus Adivasis — to deflect farm distress, unemployment, and law and order situation," Wadettiwar remarked. Countering Bhujbal's remarks at the Beed rally, Wadettiwar said his position was consistent. "I only said the OBC quota must be increased before including Marathas. Otherwise, both communities will be left empty-handed." The verbal sparring has intensified tensions within the state's political corridors, with both leaders claiming to defend OBC interests even as they trade personal barbs.

MP's 'Bhavantar' scheme to bring down soyabean rates, hit Vidarbha farmers hard

Nagpur 20 October: As Madhya Pradesh (MP) govt reintroduces the 'Bhavantar Bhugtan' scheme for soyabean after a gap of eight years, there are fears that it may leave farmers in Maharashtra at a loss. The concerns come at a time when farmers in Vidarbha reported a low harvest of the crop, and Marathwada was hit by floods. The rush in Madhya Pradesh to sell soyabean at whatever rates being offered during the three-month window and later claim the price difference is expected to create an overflow of supply in the market. With soyabean solvent extractors assured of enough soyabean supply due to the MP's 'Bhavantar' scheme, the overall rates of the crop are likely to come down, ultimately affecting farmers in other states like Maharashtra, said trade sources. Soyabean is the second major crop in



Vidarbha after cotton and also a key produce in the Marathwada region. Under the 'Bhavantar' scheme, the MP govt will be paying the difference between the minimum support price (MSP) of Rs5,328 a quintal of soyabean and the rates offered to the farmer by private traders in the open market. The scheme starts on October 25 and will remain open for three months. The 'Bhavantar' scheme was introduced in 2017 but discontinued due to issues. Initially started for

eight crops in 2025, it has been made applicable only for soyabean this time. Amit Jain, senior vice-president (protein procurement) for a firm, said the open market rates for the standard grade of soyabean are at Rs4,200. The MSP is at Rs5,328 a quintal. Jain said the 'Bhavantar' scheme can have an impact on the soyabean rates in the rest of the markets due to a sudden supply surge. Roshan Kothari, a director of an agriculture produce marketing committee (APMC) at Wani, said MP is a

major hub of soyabean. Concentrated supply during the three-month period of the 'Bhavantar' scheme will lead to assured supply for the solvent extraction plants. Soyabean is ultimately purchased by solvent extractors from the traders. "The supplies in Vidarbha are low, and yet the rates for inferior grades are as low as Rs2,000 a quintal. Even the best quality is fetching over Rs1,200 below the MSP," Kothari said. "The unfavourable weather conditions in the Vidarbha region have brought down the soyabean yield this year. The 'Bhavantar' scheme will make it worse for the farmers in Vidarbha. Maharashtra govt should also come up with a similar scheme," said Vallabh Deshmukh, a director of Mahabeej, Maharashtra govt's seed production corporation.

Scholarship exam shifted to class 4 & 7; To Be Held Twice This Year

Nagpur 20 October: The state govt has revised the pattern of its long-standing scholarship examinations for school students, shifting the eligibility to Class 4 and Class 7 instead of Class 5 and Class 8. The change, which will be implemented from the current academic year (2025-26) itself, is aimed at encouraging higher participation and improving the learning outcomes among students in govt and aided schools.

As a result of the transition, the scholarship examinations will be conducted twice this year. The existing system will continue for one last time, with the exams for Class 5 and Class 8 scheduled on the second or third Sunday of February 2026. The newly introduced pattern — for Class 4 and Class 7 students — will be held separately, likely in April or May 2026. From the next academic session (2026-27) onwards, only the new format will remain in force. Under the revised scheme, students



will receive a scholarship of Rs5,000 per year at the primary level (Class 4) and Rs7,500 per year at the upper primary level (Class 7). The Pre-Upper Primary Scholarship Examination and Pre-Secondary Scholarship Examination will now be renamed as the Primary Scholarship Examination and Upper Primary Scholarship Examination, respectively. The scholarship examination has been a part of Maharashtra's education system since 1954-55. Until 2016-17, it was conducted for Class 4 and Class 7, after which the eligibility was shifted to Class 5 and Class 8.

However, officials observed a drop in student participation following this change. The Education Department believes that reverting to the earlier

model will help boost the involvement of local body schools and enhance the academic competitiveness of both students and teachers. Students from govt, aided, and local body schools will be eligible to appear for the examination. Those from CBSE, ICSE, and other boards can participate based on specific eligibility norms. The age limit for Class 4 candidates is 10 years (14 years for students with disabilities). The admission and examination fees have been set at Rs200 (Rs50 admission + Rs150 exam) for open-category students, and Rs125 (Rs50 admission + Rs75 exam) for students from reserved categories and those with disabilities. Each participating school must also pay a registration fee of Rs200 per year to the State Examination Council. Both scholarship benefits will be applicable for a period of three years each.

Rs.3,258cr relief for rain-hit Maha farmers, Vidarbha gets Rs.804cr

Nagpur 20 October: The Maharashtra govt has approved a Rs.3,258.56cr relief package to compensate farmers whose crops were damaged by excessive rainfall and floods in Sept 2025. Of this, nearly Rs.804cr has been allocated to Vidarbha — covering both Nagpur and Amravati divisions — which reported extensive crop losses in the state. A revenue and forest department government resolution (GR) issued on Oct 18, the funds will be distributed under the state disaster response fund (SDRF) norms through direct benefit transfer (DBT) to farmers' bank accounts. The assistance will be limited to a maximum of two hectares per farmer to ensure that small and marginal cultivators receive priority.

In Vidarbha, the Nagpur division was sanctioned Rs.340.90cr to assist 3.76 lakh farmers covering 3.44 lakh hectares, while the Amravati division received Rs. 463.08cr for 4.78 lakh farmers cultivating 5.26 lakh hectares. The two divisions cumulatively account for nearly a quarter of the total aid announced for the state. Within Nagpur division, Wardha district recorded the highest loss, with Rs.142.40cr sanctioned for 1.49 lakh affected farmers. Chandrapur follows with Rs.69.46cr, Nagpur district Rs.112.37cr, while Bhandara, Gondia, and Gadchiroli together



account for around Rs.14cr. In the Amravati division, Yavatmal was earmarked the highest compensation at Rs.262.08cr, followed by Akola with Rs.162.95cr and Amravati district with Rs.38.04cr. Across Maharashtra, the GR

states that 33.65 lakh farmers have been identified as beneficiaries, covering 27.59 lakh hectares of farmland. The Nashik division received the largest allocation at Rs.1,474.84cr, followed by Pune division with Rs.951.63cr, Amravati with Rs.463.08cr, Nagpur with Rs.340.90cr, and Konkan division with Rs.28.10cr. The govt has directed all district administrations to ensure that beneficiary data is digitally verified and uploaded to official portals before disbursement. Officials have also been instructed to prevent duplication and confirm that no farmer receives multiple compensations for the same crop loss within the season.

The GR follows reports submitted by the divisional commissioners of Nagpur and Amravati on October 17, detailing widespread damage to crops. The aid is expected to provide crucial financial support to affected farmers ahead of the rabi season.

Police light up Diwali for kin of commandos who died fighting Maoists

Nagpur 20 October: Amid a wave of Maoist surrenders across the country — headlined by the surrender of senior politburo member Mallojula Venugopal Rao, known as Bhupathi or Sonu, along with 60 cadres at Gadchiroli — the Maharashtra police's tradition of celebrating Diwali with the families of commandos who laid down their lives fighting the rebels carried a deeper meaning. Officers met family of every commando who died in anti-Maoist operations, shared Diwali greetings and listened to their struggles, a gesture which evoked gratitude and sense of closure for the closed ones.

In Gadchiroli, which had been scarred by Maoist

violence in the past, additional director general of police (operations) Chherring Dorje, along with senior officers including DIG Ankit Goyal, SP Gadchiroli Neelotpal, Addl SPs M Ramesh and Gokul Raj, distributed Diwali sweets to the families of 213 fallen heroes on October 16. The initiative is in line with the focus put by director general of police, Rashmi Shukla, on welfare of such families. Addl DG Dorje spoke of the courage of the jawans whose sacrifices have weakened the Maoist grip, paving the way for a safer Gadchiroli. "These families are our own," he said, promising unwavering support from Maharashtra police. "Years of fierce battles, where brave security force personnel paid the

ultimate price, have led to this moment of hope, while internal rifts among Maoists triggered their collapse," said IG Sandip Patil, who helms the State Anti-Naxal Operation (ANO).

On October 15, when Bhupathi and 60 Maoists surrendered in presence of chief minister Devendra Fadnavis, it was being expected that about 200 more guerrillas would be giving up arms soon.

This soon turned into reality in Chhattisgarh within 48 hours. Experts see this as the end of Maoism in areas like Ajujmar and North Bastar, now declared Maoist-free. "We have a handful left in Company 10 formation of the Maoists," Fadnavis had said during the ceremony.

KBC contestant Spruha shares her journey

Nagpur 20 October: For 12-year-old Spruha Tushar Shinkhede from Nagpur, the road to the hot seat on Kaun Banega Crorepati (KBC) was anything but ordinary. The Class 8 student from Somalwar High School, Ramdaspeth, not only answered questions with calm precision but also impressed host Amitabh Bachchan with her knowledge of Sanskrit and the Bhagavad Gita.

Recalling the tense moments before making it to the hot seat, she said, "The crucial step is the Fastest Finger First round. The first time I lost. Then came the next question. I answered instantly and prayed God. Within seconds, my name was called — and the game that started there went up to Rs25 lakh before I even realized it." Spruha, who lives



in Gittikhadan, attributes her family's atmosphere at home. "I don't have Sanskrit as a subject in school, but my interest in spirituality began early. I started reading Gita during a Chinmaya Mission competition," she said. On Bachchan's request during the show, Spruha confidently recited three Sanskrit shlokas, leaving the audience awestruck.

Her father, Tushar, who works in a private firm, and her mother, Sapna, a

homemaker, said they always believed in their daughter's potential. "We were confident Spruha would reach the top ten," said Tushar. "We're proud that she won despite competing with participants who play chess with Viswanathan Anand and do coding," added Sapana. Her grandfather, noted litterateur Sunil Shinkhede, was also present during her interaction.

Spruha said nervousness about meeting megastar Amitabh Bachchan vanished the moment he walked on set. "My hands were trembling with fear, but his humility and warmth made us all feel at ease. It felt like we

were talking to one of our own," she said. She credited her teachers — especially Shweta Pavanikar from Somalwar High School — for supporting her. "I'm proud to be from Nagpur — now I don't even feel like going anywhere else," she told reporters. Contestants who answer 10 questions correctly in 90 seconds get to dine at Amitabh Bachchan's home. "I got it right — just one shot! That one question cost me dinner with Big B," she said with a laugh.

The young prodigy has also won multiple medals in academics and competitions, including a gold medal at the national-level Dr Homi Bhabha Children's Science Competition. She even showcased her acting talent in a Reserve Bank of India museum documentary in Kolkata.

Diwali Delight: Cops Return Rs 1.6 Cr Stolen Goods in five days

Nagpur 20 October: For Yogita Yavalkar, a senior govt employee, Diwali came early. "My wedding ring coming back before Diwali is almost like a bonus to me," she said, her voice turning emotional as police returned her stolen engagement ring at a ceremony organised by six police stations under Zone One, West Nagpur, on Saturday.

In a city-wide initiative led by Commissioner of Police Ravinder Singal, Nagpur police returned stolen goods of Rs1.59 crore to over 100 citizens within just five days. The effort, coordinated across all six zones under CP Singal and Joint CP Navinchandra Reddy, culminated in a 'Return of Assets Ceremony' on Dhanteras. Among those reunited with their valuables was industrial contractor Pravin Shendre, son of a retired police officer. His home at Hingna T-point had been looted by burglars posing as workers, who later fled to Bijnore in Uttar Pradesh. "The burglars mocked us while fleeing, but the police ensured justice," said Shendre, who received his stolen gold back after MIDC police cracked the case. Yavalkar's ordeal began a month ago when a thief smashed her car window, stealing valuables worth around Rs3 lakh — including her ring, pension documents, and identity papers.

State forms committee to ensure enough gunnybags supply before MSP procurement

Nagpur 20 October: Taking lessons from last year's experience, the state government plans to keep its stock of gunny bags full ahead of the upcoming procurement season. A shortage of sacks had hampered soyabean procurement at MSP last year. The government has now formed a committee headed by marketing minister Jayakumar Rawal to monitor the purchase and availability of gunny bags.

A government resolution (GR) detailing the supply mechanism was issued on Friday. The secretary of Cooperation and Marketing and the managing director of the Maharashtra State Cooperative Marketing Federation are among the eight members of the committee.

The GR notes that in 2024, soyabean

Zone Two, led by DCP Nitayanand Jha, returned goods worth Rs 48.3 lakh; Zone Four, under DCP Rashmitha Rao, restored Rs 45 lakh; and Zone Five, guided by DCP Niketan Karan, handed back Rs 24 lakh in valuables. CP Singal urged citizens to install CCTV cameras, saying they "deter crime and aid conviction." Joint CP Reddy highlighted the importance of the "golden hour" after a crime, stressing that prompt reporting greatly improves detection rates.

procurement had slowed down due to a shortage of sacks, ultimately affecting farmers' earnings. To prevent a repeat, the committee has been constituted to ensure an adequate and timely supply of gunny bags, it states. The committee will oversee the tender process for gunny bag procurement and ensure smooth supply. The expenditure will be borne by the state marketing federation, which will later be reimbursed by the national federation.

Meanwhile, farmers say the initial open market rates for soyabean are below the MSP of Rs.5,328 per quintal. Sources said growers in the region are currently fetching Rs. 3,200–4,000 per quintal for the crop. Soyabean is the second major farm produce of Vidarbha after cotton.

A Perfect Match: Parsis Celebrate Cricket, Culture & Bonding

Nagpur 20 October: This innings was built over 37 years, and many partnerships were stitched not only on the pitch, but also off it. Here, smiles matter more than the scoreboard and partnerships flourish not just between batsmen, but between cities, families — and sometimes, even hearts. What began as a simple idea has now grown into one of the most awaited events in the Parsi calendar — the Jiji Irani Cup — which brings together over a hundred Parsis for cricket, food, laughter, and camaraderie. Organised by Nagpur Parsi Gymkhana, the tournament entered its 37th edition this weekend. "Interestingly, this cricket tournament started just for fun," says Parheez Gimi, assistant secretary of Nagpur Parsi Panchayat, watching players take positions at the Veterinary College Ground on Saturday morning. "A few friends came together decades ago to play cricket. Then one city joined, and another, and soon it became a tradition. Over the years, many couples even met here — it's funny, but it really happens!"

This is a fun meetup for everyone," says Parheez. The venue shifts to each participating city every year and Nagpur is the host city this year. Teams from Hyderabad, Kolkata, Surat, Jamshedpur, and Nagpur are battling it out on the field, with Nagpur and Jamshedpur joining forces this year. Matches are being held at Veterinary College Ground and the WCL Ground, Seminary Hills. Parheez, whose father Shiraz was one of those who helped start the tournament in 1985, reflected on its evolution. "Back then, my father and a few others in Jamshedpur and Nagpur decided cricket could be the reason for everyone to meet. Slowly, more cities joined. It wasn't about winning; it was about connecting. Even today, that spirit remains."

Seeing youngsters, families, and even couples here — it's heart-warming and, honestly, a lot of fun!"

says Parheez. "Our community may be small, but events like this keep us united," says Navroze Daver, secretary of Nagpur Parsi Panchayat. Daver shares that friendships, family bonds, and even marriages happen here. "My daughter met her husband through the Jiji Irani Cup. It's a reunion every year — a week full of laughter, music, and food that we all live for," Daver says. Minoo Siganporia, from Hyderabad, has been part of the tournament since 1986 as a player, coach, and convener. "I still remember our first match — no uniforms, no sponsors, just excitement and love for the game. Today, seeing the next generation carry it forward makes me proud. The spirit hasn't faded; it has only grown stronger." Noomi Mehta, 73, from Kolkata, says they were determined to meet even during the Covid pandemic. "The game isn't the only attraction — it's seeing friends, reconnecting with old faces, and enjoying the food. Parsis love food! The first thing we check isn't the pitch, it's the menu," he laughs.

Daisy Shahrukh Patel from Surat waits for this week all year. "It's not just cricket; it's a celebration. We meet friends, enjoy food and music, and even couples have met here many times! Children, youngsters, and grown-ups all look forward to this fun meetup. It's a time to be youthful, socialise, and keep our culture alive." Tauby Bhagwagar, president of the Nagpur Parsi Gymkhana, emphasises the importance of community, nurturing youngsters and continuing the tradition. "Parsis are small but closely knit. The Gymkhana has hosted the Jiji Irani Cup for 37 years. Our first president was truly remarkable — he used to personally pick all kids from home if needed."

He guided the young, ensuring they learned not just cricket, but the spirit of togetherness. This year, with Nagpur and Jamshedpur teaming up, that spirit is stronger than ever."

Include Morwa airport in 'UDAN scheme': MLA Sudhir Mungantiwar

Chandrapur 20 October: In view of the overall development of Chandrapur district and keeping in mind industrial, tourism and economic progress of Vidarbha, MLA Sudhir Mungantiwar has written a letter to Union Civil Aviation Minister K Naidu demanding the inclusion of Morwa Airport in the UDAN Yojana. He has also requested to start flight services from Chandrapur to major cities like Pune, Mumbai and Delhi. MLA Mungantiwar has mentioned in this memorandum that Chandrapur district is the hub of the highest number of coal, power, cement, paper and bamboo industries in the



state. This district has become important at the national level due to many large industrial and energy generation projects like Chandrapur Super Thermal Power Station, Ballarpur Paper Mill, Ferro Alloys, Dhariwal, Wardha Power, GMR Project. But due to lack

of air connectivity, citizens, entrepreneurs, officials, as well as foreign tourists of this area have to depend on Nagpur and other cities, which wastes time and money. MLA Mungantiwar has explained in the letter that Morwa Airport, which is situated just 9 km away from Chandrapur city, is geographically very favourable. At present, C90, AB 200, CJ1 aircraft and all types of helicopters can fly from here. But if the 700-metre runway is expanded, it will be possible to start passenger air services. He has requested the central government to include this project in the 'Udan Yojana'

and provide necessary funds and permission. Chandrapur district has become a centre of attraction for tourists from home and abroad for the Tadoba Andhari Tiger Reserve, forest tourism, religious places and industrial projects. If air services are started at such a time, the local economy will get a new momentum, tourism and investment will increase and new employment opportunities will be created. He has mentioned in the letter that short-haul passenger air services are not just a means of transportation, but the beginning of a new era of development.

Nagpur & Ajni Stations Step Up Preparations for Diwali and Chhath Puja Rush

Nagpur 20 October: In view of the heavy passenger rush during the Diwali and Chhath Puja festival, Nagpur and Ajni railway stations of Central Railway have made extensive arrangements to ensure smooth operations and passenger convenience. A total of 276 CCTV cameras at Nagpur station and 31 cameras at Ajni station have been installed to enhance surveillance and safety. The monitoring is being done jointly by RPF and Commercial Department staff from two control rooms - one RPF Control Room at the station and another at the DRM Control War Room. To maintain round-the-clock security, 78 RPF personnel and 28 GRP personnel have been deployed on 24x7 duty. Deposit rate cut by 70-80bps to ease margin pressure in coming quarters: PNB MD

New Delhi, 20 October: Punjab National Bank (PNB) reported strong second quarter numbers with a 14% jump in net profit, robust business growth and sharp improvement in asset quality. The bank's Managing Director and Chief Executive Officer, Ashok Chandra, spoke with reporters and provided detailed insights into the key growth drivers, and addressed key concern areas like flat Net Interest Income (NII) and margin pressure. **Exports:**

Congratulations on a good quarter. Your net profit grew by 14%, but net interest income remained flat while asset quality improved significantly. What were the main drivers this quarter?

Retail, Agriculture, and MSME have played a very important role. We have activated our 10,200 branches, the second-largest network in the country — and business should come from there, which has now started. Retail grew by 18.1%, Agriculture by 13%, and MSME by 18.6%. This gives us confidence that credit growth is on track. Our corporate loan book also showed a year-on-year growth of 7.9% and a quarter-on-quarter growth of 3%. Our sanctioned corporate loan book has increased to Rs 1.78 lakh crore. All this put together, I see good loan growth happening for the bank. So, you are seeing good corporate credit growth.

We have good proposals. Last financial year (2024-25), our total corporate sanctioned book was Rs 1.7 lakh crore. This year, we have achieved the same in just six months. This means the bank has done very well in garnering good proposals across various segments—infrastructure, renewable energy, iron and steel, food processing, smart metering, warehousing, and roads.

But your Net Interest Income (NII) remained flat compared to last year. What is the reason?

One important factor is the rate cut. A 100+ basis point cut impacted this quarter fully, whereas in Q1, it was only for part of the quarter. The repricing of deposits is happening now. We had special deposit schemes at 7.25% and 7.75% that are now maturing and being repriced at 6.4% and 6.5%. We have reduced fixed deposit rates by around 70-80 basis points. The full impact of this will be seen in Q3 and Q4. We expect a 5-7 basis point improvement in NIM (Net interest margin) in Q3 and a 10-15 basis point improvement in Q4.

How much of your deposits have been repriced so far? Will you be able to pass on the full 100 basis point rate cut to depositors?

Around 40% to 50% of deposits have been repriced. The remainder will take some time in this quarter and Q4.

Passing on the full 100 basis point cut will be a challenge. We have to be mindful of depositor preferences and market competition. We can't offer 7.25% for 400 days and then drop it to 6.25% immediately; that will take time. However, with the repricing to 6.4% and 6.5%, a 70-80 basis point reduction is happening. We have also reduced the Savings Bank (SB) interest rate, which is a significant component for us. All these impacts will be visible in the coming quarters.

'Progress made, no major differences': Commerce Ministry sources on US-India trade talks

New Delhi, 20 October: India is not rushing for the trade deal with the US and both are exploring a win-win situation, however there are no major differences between the two countries and progresses are happening during the discussions, say sources from India's Commerce Ministry.

A team of Indian delegates from the Ministry of Commerce headed by the Commerce Secretary, Rajesh Agarwal visited Washington last week regarding the trade negotiations discussions. "There are no major differences between India and the US in terms of trade negotiations. During every discussion there is some progress made," said the source. In February this year, leaders of India and the US directed officials to negotiate a proposed Bilateral Trade Agreement (BTA). They have fixed a deadline to conclude the first tranche of the pact by the fall (October-November) of 2025. So far, five rounds of negotiations have been completed. Last month, Goyal led an official delegation to New York for trade talks. The proposed trade agreement between India and the US aims to more than double the bilateral trade to \$500 billion by 2030. The US has remained India's largest trading partner for the fourth consecutive year in 2024-25. According to the commerce ministry data, goods exports to the US fell by more than 20 percent to \$5.43 billion in September from \$6.87 billion in August, with tariffs impacting the shipments of items like carpets, textiles, shrimp, and gems and jewellery. However, the total export to the US between April and September 2025 went up by more than 13 percent as compared to the same period in previous year. In the first six months, the total value of exports to the US stood at \$45.82 billion this year, while it was \$40.42 billion in 2024. While the discussions with the US is on, Commerce Minister Piyush Goyal will also be visiting Berlin and Munich after Diwali for Berlin dialogue and proceed with the next round of talks with the European Union regarding Free trade agreements.

Gold, silver prices see massive fall after touching record high

Mumbai 20 October: After a bumper rally over the past few weeks, the precious metals market witnessed a sharp correction on Friday, as both Gold and Silver prices tumbled on the Multi Commodity Exchange (MCX). The decline came amid a profit-taking wave triggered by specific external market factors that temporarily eased geopolitical and economic anxieties. Gold prices of 24 kt on MCX, which had recently touched a record high of Rs 1,32,294 per 10 grams, fell by around 3 per cent to Rs 1,25,957 per 10 grams. Silver saw an even steeper fall, declining by more than 8 per cent, slipping from Rs 1,70,415 per kg to Rs 1,53,929 per kg. Market experts described the correction as a healthy and expected development following an extraordinary rally in recent months. Ajay Bagga, Banking and Market Expert, told reporters that Friday's price fall was a "necessary tactical retreat" driven by short-term sentiment shifts and natural profit-taking after a historic rally. He pointed out that one of the key factors behind the sudden pullback was the more conciliatory tone from U.S. President Donald Trump regarding the threatened high tariffs on China, which helped ease global tensions. "The strategic case for Gold and Silver remains highly compelling, supported by structural factors including global de-dollarization, persistent deficits in Silver, central bank accumulation, and an environment of low real interest rates and high geopolitical risk," Bagga added. According to Bagga, Silver's outlook remains even stronger than Gold's due to its dual nature as both a precious metal and a critical industrial metal. "Given the recent speculative frenzy and physical market dislocation, traders must be cautious. However, the long-term trend remains firmly upward, supported by industrial growth," he said. MCX, which stands for Multi Commodity Exchange of India, is India's first listed electronic commodity derivatives exchange where online trading of commodity futures and options takes place.

Deepavali



Diwali also called Deepavali or Deepawali is the Hindu festival of lights, with variations celebrated in other Indian religions such as Jainism and Sikhism. It symbolises the spiritual victory of Dharma over Adharma, light over darkness, good over evil, and knowledge over ignorance. Diwali is celebrated during the Hindu lunisolar months of Ashvin (according to the amanta tradition) and Kartika — between around mid-September and mid-November. The celebrations generally last five or six days. Diwali is connected to various religious events, deities and personalities, such as being the day Rama returned to his kingdom in Ayodhya with his wife Sita and his brother Lakshmana after defeating the demon king Ravana. It is also widely associated with Lakshmi, the goddess of prosperity, and Ganesha, the god of wisdom and the remover of obstacles. Other regional traditions connect the holiday to Vishnu, Krishna, Durga, Shiva, Kali, Hanuman, Kubera, Yama,

Yami, Dhanvantari, or Vishvakarman. Primarily a Hindu festival, variations of Diwali are also celebrated by adherents of other faiths. The Jains observe their own Diwali which marks the final liberation of Mahavira. The Sikhs celebrate Bandi Chhor Divas to mark the release of Guru Hargobind from a Mughal prison. Newar Buddhists, unlike other Buddhists, celebrate Diwali by worshipping Lakshmi,

while the Hindus of Eastern India and Bangladesh generally, celebrate Diwali by worshipping the goddess Kali. During the festival, the celebrants illuminate their homes, temples and workspaces with diyas (oil lamps), candles and lanterns. Hindus, in particular, have a ritual oil bath at dawn on each day of the festival. Diwali is also marked with fireworks as well as the decoration of floors with rangoli designs and other

parts of the house with jhalars. Food is a major focus with families partaking in feasts and sharing mithai. The festival is an annual homecoming and bonding period not only for families, but also for communities and associations, particularly those in urban areas, which will organise activities, events, and gatherings. Many towns organise community parades and fairs with parades or music and dance performances in parks. Some Hindus, Jains, and Sikhs will send Diwali greeting cards to family near and far during the festive season, occasionally with boxes of Indian confectionery. Another aspect of the festival is remembering the ancestors. Diwali is also a major cultural event for the Hindu, Sikh, and Jain diaspora. The main day of the festival of Diwali (the day of Lakshmi Puja) is an official holiday in Fiji, Guyana, India, Malaysia, Mauritius, Myanmar, Nepal, Pakistan, Singapore, Sri Lanka, Suriname, Trinidad and Tobago and in some US states.

Rarely has potential, all-round skill merged with supreme athletic abilities to produce a sportsman like him. Even today, his name evokes awe and a gasp in infinite admiration for the seemingly impossible feats achieved with ease and



elegance. And anyone having followed cricket in the 1970s will never forget the sight of Andy Roberts, pounding the ground with his powerful, strong legs, sprinting towards the batsmen and unleashing the ball, combining impeccable length with furious speed and pace. You could feel fear all around. You could see it in the eyes of the batsman. You could sense it among the spectators.

Indian actor shaved her head for Star Trek role, almost became Bond girl, made history as first Indian to present at Oscars

Chennai, 20 October: Before actors like Irrfan Khan and Priyanka Chopra made a name for themselves in Hollywood, Persis Khambatta — a middle-class girl from Mumbai — had already achieved what many could only dream of. She became one of the earliest and most well-known Indian success stories in Hollywood, breaking stereotypes and paving the way for future generations of actors. Persis is still remembered for her iconic portrayal of Lieutenant Ilia in Star Trek: The Motion Picture. But to truly understand her impact, one must begin with her childhood.

Persis' father left her at the age of two

Persis Khambatta was born into a middle-class Parsi family in Mumbai. Her early life was marked by struggle, as her father left the family when she was just two years old. She attended St. Joseph's Convent High School and later enrolled at St. Xavier's College, Mumbai. However, she dropped out during her first year to pursue modelling full-time. This turning point came in 1968, when, at just 13, she was discovered by a



photographer while dining with her family at a restaurant. He took her test shots, which ended up being used in an advertising campaign for Rexona soap. The success of that campaign marked the beginning of her modelling career.

Beginning of her modeling career

Persis Khambatta went on to win the Miss India title in 1965, impressing everyone despite wearing off-the-rack clothes she had bought herself. She became the second winner of the Femina Miss India pageant and the third Indian woman ever to participate in Miss Universe. After her win, her modelling career flourished, and she worked with major brands such as Air India, Revlon, and Garden of Eatin'. It wasn't long before Bollywood came

Time for diplomacy to end Ukraine war, ease oil plan



After claiming success in brokering a ceasefire in Gaza, US President Donald Trump is now turning his attention to the Ukraine war. Following what both sides described as a "very productive" phone call with Russian President Vladimir Putin on Thursday, the two leaders agreed to meet in Budapest, Hungary, possibly within a fortnight. The conversation came a day before Trump's meeting with Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy, where a deal for long-range American Tomahawk

missiles was under discussion.

Such weapons may not end the war, but their ability to strike deep inside Russia could complicate an already tense equation.

Yet Trump's fresh diplomatic effort deserves attention—not least because the prolonged conflict has disrupted global supply chains and kept energy prices volatile. For India, which imports over 85 per cent of its crude needs, stability in oil markets is crucial to containing inflation and sustaining growth.

Protect elephants for a healthier ecosystem

India's elephant population has fallen by 17.8 percent since 2017, according to the latest report from the Wildlife Institute of India. The total count now stands at 22,446—a sobering reminder that the country's most iconic species is under mounting pressure. The Western Ghats, India's largest elephant habitat, recorded 11,934 elephants, down slightly from 11,960 in 2017. But the drop in the Northeast Hills and Brahmaputra plains—from 10,139 to 6,559—is alarming. The Shivalik Hills saw a marginal decline, while Central India and the Eastern Ghats recorded a sharp fall from 3,128 to 1,891. The latest census, which began in 2021, used DNA-based mark-



recapture, a more scientific and precise method that identifies individual elephants through their biological samples. While this could partly explain the statistical drop, it does not alter the grim reality: elephant habitats are shrinking, and threats are multiplying. Deforestation, encroachment, expanding infrastructure, and human-elephant conflicts are steadily eroding the species' space to live and roam. Rail and road networks now crisscross traditional corridors, leading to frequent and often fatal collisions.

Metro Phase-3 Should Be Extended ToKhaparkheda, Urges Saoner MLA

Nagpur 20 October: Saoner MLA Ashish Deshmukh proposed extending the upcoming Nagpur Metro Phase-III line from Koradi to Khaparkheda, citing the area's increasing population and growing commuter needs. On Friday, Deshmukh met MahaMetro managing director Shrawan Hardikar to present the proposal and formally discuss its feasibility.

As per the existing plan, the Metro line is set to terminate at Koradi. However, Deshmukh stressed that extending the route further to Khaparkheda would greatly benefit residents and workers in the region, particularly those employed at the thermal power plant and surrounding industrial areas. The extension, he said, would decongest key routes, improve safety, and serve as a long-term mobility solution for thousands who travel daily between Nagpur, Koradi, and Khaparkheda. Speaking to reporters, Deshmukh said that the proposal came up earlier during a meeting between Union minister Nitin Gadkari, chief minister Devendra Fadnavis, and guardian



minister Chandrashekhar Bawankule, who strongly supported the idea of connecting Koradi and Khaparkheda through Metro. "Heavy traffic congestion and frequent accidents, especially on the Mankapur flyover, are proof of the urgent need for an alternative transit system," he said. "Additionally, the metro is a popular means of transport in Nagpur, and if brought to these areas, then it will be of great use to the locals," he said. Deshmukh added that areas such as Koradi, Mahadula, Parseoni, and nearby localities are witnessing rapid growth in both population and housing projects. "Extending the Metro line to

Khaparkheda is not only viable but also essential for the future. It will save travel time, reduce fuel expenses, and provide an affordable and safe travel option for local commuters," he said. Deshmukh further pointed to the Kamptee-Kanhan Metro corridor plan. "A similar extension to Khaparkheda can bring balanced growth to the northern belt," he said. MahaMetro MD Shrawan Hardikar said, "Khaparkheda is an important stretch, and we plan to prioritise its development given the promising ridership potential. The corridor is part of the Comprehensive Mobility Plan (CMP), and we are currently exploring the possibility of

extending it up to Khaparkheda. A detailed feasibility analysis, including parameters such as PHPDT (Peak Hour Peak Direction Traffic) and implementation aspects, is underway." As a part of CMP, Nagpur Metro proposed Phase-III in July end this year, which will extend the city's network with a new Sitabuldi-Koradi corridor spanning around 11.5km. The corridor will branch out from Kasturchand Park station, with an initial underground stretch of nearly 3km due to the dense city core and multiple flyovers, while the rest is expected to be elevated.

The line will feature about 10 stations, designed to improve connectivity between central Nagpur and the rapidly developing Koradi region.

Officials estimate a daily ridership of 1.47 lakh passengers by 2054 on this route alone. The projected cost for the corridor is around Rs3,500 crore, though final figures will depend on the Detailed Project Report (DPR), which is yet to be completed.

Avoid sharing Diwali travel posts on social media to prevent thefts: CP

Nagpur 20 October: In a timely advisory amid the Diwali celebrations, commissioner of police, Ravinder Singal, has urged citizens to exercise caution when sharing holiday information like holiday pictures, live locations, or travel updates on social media. This alert comes as a preventive measure to ensure personal safety and safeguarding property from tech-savvy criminals who tend to exploit such data to target individuals or homes. "Diwali is not just a festival but also a time for vacations, and oversharing on social media can invite danger," Singal emphasized during a recent ceremony for returning stolen assets.

He elaborated that posting selfies from holiday destinations, updating statuses about being away from home, or tagging locations can inadvertently send a signal to adversaries or criminals that a house is unoccupied. Senior police officials have noted a concerning increase in burglaries, where criminals adept at using technology



monitor platforms like Instagram and Facebook for signs of vacant residences. "Today's criminals are not just street-smart; they're internet-savvy.

A simple post indicating you're away for Diwali could lead to break-ins, risking your valuables and even your safety upon return," Singal warned. Recent cases in the city, including high-value thefts, have shown how perpetrators used online information to time their crimes when homes were unguarded. Zonal DCP Rashmitha Rao has disseminated detailed dos and

donts through WhatsApp groups and social media channels. Rao's guidelines emphasise securing assets. "Avoid leaving cash, jewellery, electronics, or important documents at home. Store them in bank lockers or vaults instead," Rao advised in her guidelines. Rao also urged residents to refrain from flaunting wealth in public or online, especially amid the bustling Diwali shopping crowds, which could attract pickpockets or scammers.

A key aspect of the advisory is enhancing home security measures. Singal strongly recommended

installing CCTV cameras, especially in urban apartments where community ties may be weaker. "In flats, people often live in isolation without knowing their neighbours. CCTVs act as a powerful deterrent — criminals fear being recorded," he noted. These systems not only prevent crimes but also provide vital digital evidence for police investigations, aiding in swift identifications and convictions. For those planning to travel this Diwali, Singal suggested informing trustworthy neighbours or local police about their absence, facilitating a community watch. Additional anti-theft measures include activating motion-sensor lights, double-locking vehicles, and ensuring no valuables are visible in cars. The guidelines from DCP Rao also cover firecracker safety, advocating for eco-friendly alternatives to prevent accidents, and provide emergency contact numbers, including the national helpline 112 and Nagpur Control Room numbers (0712-2562222, 2566336).

NMC begins division of voters for 38 prabhags ahead of civic polls

Nagpur 20 October: With several assembly constituencies overlapping multiple civic zones, the Nagpur Municipal Corporation (NMC) has begun the complex exercise of dividing voters' lists for all 38 prabhags ahead of the upcoming civic polls. Sources said that despite the extensive verification work, the voters' lists and ward boundaries will largely remain the same as those used in the 2017 municipal elections. Municipal commissioner Abhijeet Chaudhari on Saturday held a training session for officials from all 10 zones and set November 2 as the deadline for submission of prabhag-wise voters' lists. Zone-wise teams have already been formed which will begin field verification from Monday, cross-checking the State Election Commission's (SEC) data to ensure that all voters fall correctly within the final prabhag boundaries. Each team, consisting of five members, comprises an engineer, a tax inspector — who is familiar with property addresses — and a health inspector.

The team will verify house-to-house voter mapping irrespective of assembly constituency boundaries. The objective is to align every voter within the civic limits to the correct prabhag, based on the recently finalised demarcations approved by the SEC. The task is especially challenging as several assembly constituencies encompass areas from multiple NMC zones.

The South Assembly constituency covers major portions of Hanuman Nagar, Dhantoli, and Nehru Nagar zones, while the South-West assembly constituency draws nearly 70% of its voters from Laxmi Nagar Zone and smaller parts from Ashi Nagar, Satranjipura, and Lakadganj zones. Likewise, Central Nagpur includes extensive areas of Gandhibagh Zone and portions of Satranjipura, Dhantoli, and Hanuman Nagar zones. Similarly, the East Assembly constituency comprises around 80% of Lakadganj Zone and a few pockets of Satranjipura, Nehru Nagar, and Gandhibagh zones, while the West Assembly constituency has most of its areas in Dharampeth and Mangalwari zones. The North Assembly constituency predominantly covers Ashi Nagar Zone along with smaller sections of Mangalwari and Satranjipura.

Additionally, the Hudkeshwar and Narsala localities of the Kamptee Assembly constituency fall under Hanuman Nagar Zone. Officials admitted that reconciling assembly-wise lists with prabhag boundaries across zones is proving to be one of the most complex pre-poll tasks. "We have to ensure that every voter listed under the SEC rolls is placed in the correct prabhag

as per the NMC jurisdiction. Even minor discrepancies can affect the final electoral rolls," said a senior civic official privy to the development. Another challenge is the addition of over one lakh voters since the 2017 civic elections. Apart from new additions, the teams have been directed to ensure that names of deceased, deleted, or relocated voters are not retained in the final rolls. For the upcoming elections, prabhag numbers 1 to 37 will each elect four corporators, while prabhag number 38 will have three corporators. After the zone-wise verification and compilation, the finalised prabhag-wise voters' lists will be published on November 6, setting the stage for the much-awaited civic polls in Nagpur.

Pre-Diwali Dusting Triggers Cough & Breathing Troubles

Nagpur 20 October : As the festive season begins, city doctors are reporting a steady rise in H3N2 influenza and Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) infections across Nagpur. Pulmonologists have cautioned that many patients visiting OPDs these days are suffering from these two viral infections, and the dust generated during pre-Diwali cleaning and painting is further aggravating breathing problems. "This time of the year, we are seeing a sharp increase in patients complaining of respiratory, throat irritation, fever, and breathing difficulty.

The majority are testing positive for H3N2 or RSV. Both these viruses affect the respiratory tract, and the dust and chemical fumes during Diwali preparations make the symptoms worse," said Dr Akash Balki, senior pulmonologist. H3N2 and RSV are both respiratory viruses that spread through the air when an infected person coughs or sneezes. The H3N2 influenza is a type of seasonal flu virus that affects the nose, throat, and sometimes lungs. It causes fever, body ache, sore throat, and fatigue,



but in some people — especially those with asthma, COPD, or low immunity — it can lead to serious lung infections. "RSV (Respiratory Syncytial Virus) is another common virus that causes cold-like symptoms but can be severe in young children, the elderly, and people with weak lungs.

It can lead to pneumonia or wheezing, making breathing difficult. October to December is the time when seasonal viruses thrive, aided by fluctuating temperatures and air pollution. During this period, Diwali preparations also contribute to the problem," said Dr Balki.

The dust from cleaning old furniture, curtains, and shelves, and the chemical fumes from wall paints, varnish, and rangoli colours act as triggers for viral infections and allergic reactions. "Even those who are otherwise healthy may experience an allergic cough or sinus congestion during Diwali cleaning. But for people with asthma, bronchitis, or those recovering from viral infections like H3N2 and RSV, this can lead to severe breathlessness," added Dr Balki.

Traffic Crawls Through Old City As Diwali Rush Chokes Roads



Nagpur 20 October: The festive rush ahead of Diwali brought traffic to a near standstill in several parts of the old city on Sunday, as thousands of vehicles poured into traditional market zones like Itwari, Mahal, and Central Avenue. With Monday being Chhoti Diwali, roads across these commercial pockets remained choked for hours despite police deployment and multiple diversion plans. Central Avenue, the main arterial stretch connecting eastern and central Nagpur, going between Mahal and Itwari, witnessed heavy snarls throughout the day, with vehicles inching forward near Aghasara Square, Gandhi Patha Square, and Darodkar Square.

Internal roads leading to Mahal and Itwari were no different — narrow lanes packed with shoppers, hawkers, and parked two-wheelers left little room for traffic to move. Senior officials from Kotwali police station said that around 80 officers, including homeguards, were deployed just in the Mahal and Itwari areas. The situation was particularly severe along the Kelibagh Road stretch from Kotwali police station to Badkas Chowk till Gandhi Patha Square, where hawkers occupied nearly 60% of the road space. "Even a two-wheeler can barely pass through now. The hawkers have extended right onto the road," said a local shopkeeper. Police officials acknowledged the congestion but said the volume of vehicles was unusually high this weekend. "This is the last shopping weekend before Diwali and the rush was expected. We've stationed additional staff across Mahal, Itwari, and Central Avenue to regulate traffic and prevent gridlocks," said a senior officer from the Traffic Department. Cotton Market zone Traffic PI Suhas Raut told reporter that they are executing multiple anti-encroachment drives with the NMC, and while it provides temporary relief, the hawkers come back. "Primarily, we are trying to clear out a way for traffic and let vehicles pass. That remains our top priority," he said. The no-entry zones for heavy vehicles in these markets, though aimed at easing crowd movement, added to the chaos on connecting roads like CA Road and parts of Gandhibagh.

With limited parking options, many shoppers left vehicles on roadside stretches, causing further obstruction. To manage the situation, patrolling jeeps were deployed at strategic junctions to clear bottlenecks. Traffic police were also seen directing vehicles manually, especially near key intersections where signals failed to manage the volume. Despite the congestion, the atmosphere remained festive, with the sound of car horns mixing with the buzz of Diwali shoppers.

383 stray dogs sterilised in three weeks at Besa Pipla

sterilising, vaccinating, and releasing stray dogs after proper recovery. "The task is carried out daily by a dedicated veterinary team comprising two veterinarians, two para-veterinary assistants, and one dog-catching vehicle operating across various localities of Besa

and Pipla.

Each surgery is followed by a 20 to 30-minute recovery period, after which the animals are monitored for health and stability before being safely released back to their original locations," he said. As of October 14, all 383 captured dogs had been sterilised and vaccinated, and 256 released after recovery.

Nandanwar emphasised that the primary goal of the drive is not only population control but also the prevention of rabies and other diseases, ensuring a safer and healthier coexistence between residents and stray animals.

From Darkness to Light: SMHRC Doctors Restore Vision in Complex Eye Injury Case

Based on a complaint by Dr. Rashmi Vinod Shripasad Tiwari (26), Hudkeshwar Police registered a case under Sections 279 and 338 of the BNS along with Sections 134 and 177 of the Motor Vehicles Act against the errant motorcyclist. Further investigation is underway.

Elderly man found dead in well near Jagruteshwar Temple



Nagpur 20 October: An unidentified elderly man, believed to be around 80 years old, was found dead in a well near Jagruteshwar Temple under the Tehsil Police jurisdiction on Saturday morning. Locals spotted the body floating in the well around 7.30 am and informed the police. The

man was pulled out and rushed to Mayo Hospital, where doctors declared him brought dead. Tehsil Police have registered a case of accidental death under Section 174 of the CrPC, and further investigation is being conducted by PSI Khan to ascertain the identity and cause of death.

High Court questions irregular fund disbursement under MNREGA

Nagpur 20 October: The Nagpur Bench of the Bombay High Court has questioned the State Government over the alleged disbursement of funds under the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MNREGA) at the behest of local political representatives, instead of following the prescribed legal procedure. The court was hearing a petition filed by the Akhil Bhartiya Gram Panchayat Association, which raised serious concerns over irregularities in the release of MNREGA funds. The petition alleged that certain gram panchayats with political connections were receiving preferential treatment, bypassing the seniority list and obtaining out-of-turn fund releases by influencing government officials. Acting on the petition, the High Court had earlier issued notices to the State of Maharashtra, Commissioner, MNREGA, and the Deputy CEO, Zilla Parishad, Gondia. Advocate Surabhi Godbole Naidu, appearing for the petitioners, informed the court that after every project is completed by a gram panchayat, a Fund Transfer Order (FTO) is generated and verified at various administrative levels — from

the Panchayat Samiti to the Zilla Parishad — before being forwarded to the MNREGA Commissioner for final approval and fund release. However, Naidu pointed out that FTOs amounting to approximately Rs 150 crore (Rs 1500 lakh), approved between 2022 and 2024, were still pending disbursement. As a result, gram panchayats were unable to pay vendors who had supplied materials for community development works — causing severe financial hardship despite no fault of their own. The petitioner alleged that certain gram panchayats with “influential nexus” to MLAs and political leaders managed to jump the queue by securing recommendation letters, resulting in the release of funds for works completed much later (January–March 2024), while older FTOs remained pending. Interestingly, the Zilla Parishad, Gondia, in its reply, confirmed several of the petitioner’s allegations. During the hearing, the State sought additional time to respond, prompting the High Court to pass a sharp observation. The bench directed the Additional Government Pleader to explain whether MNREGA funds could legally be released based

on the recommendations of political representatives—individuals who hold no authority under the MNREGA Act, 2005, or its guidelines to influence such disbursements. The Court noted that the affidavit filed by the Panchayat Samiti, Gondia, was silent on this critical issue and granted the State a final opportunity to file a detailed reply. Despite the High Court’s scrutiny, recent developments suggest that the practice of politically influenced disbursements may have continued. The State Government recently released Rs 1,200 crore in MNREGA funds across Maharashtra, of which Rs 40 crore was allocated to Gondia district. The petitioner claims that once again, politically connected gram panchayats secured preferential releases, sidestepping seniority norms even while the case remains sub judice. Following this, the petitioners have issued a contempt notice to the Commissioner, MNREGA, and are moving to circulate the matter before the High Court for urgent hearing. Advocates Surabhi Godbole Naidu, Prakash Naidu, Joseph Bastian, and Dhruv Sharma appeared on behalf of the petitioners.

Stolen valuables worth Rs 45 lakh returned to citizens at ‘Property Return Ceremony’ organised by Zone 4 police

Across neighbourhoods, greeting posters, social media messages, and large hoardings featuring smiling candidates have sprung up overnight, setting the tone for an early campaign season. One of the most striking trends this year is the launch of “Tirth Darshan” (pilgrimage) bustours—free temple visits for senior citizens, organised and sponsored by prospective candidates seeking blessings and visibility. These trips, described as “social service” activities, have quickly gained popularity as they allow direct interaction with voters in a relaxed, devotional



setting. “No one wants to miss this opportunity to talk to people before the Model Code of Conduct is announced,” admitted a local politico. Public engagement has taken a festive turn with “Diwali Pahat” musical mornings, Diwali Milan gatherings, rangoli competitions, and lantern decoration contests being organised across various wards. However, the scramble to stay visible is proving costly. Even first-time aspirants are reportedly feeling the financial strain of these elaborate outreach drives, well before nominations have even begun. At the same time, frustration among citizens

continues over the four-member ward system introduced in the NMC. Residents complain that councillors often “pass responsibility to each other,” leaving many basic civic issues unresolved. “Who is responsible for my area?” has become a common refrain in several neighbourhoods. Behind the festive smiles and gestures of devotion, however, voters appear cautious. “Why so many sudden pilgrimages, wishes, and service camps — and all just before elections?” is the question doing the rounds in local circles. For now, Nagpur’s political landscape is gleaming in festive hues — with temple tours, glowing lanterns, and “service” drives turning into campaign tools as candidates blend faith, festivals, and politics in the run-up to the polls.

Rising prices, same spark: Nagpur readies for a sparkling Diwali

Nagpur 20 October: Rising prices haven’t dulled Nagpur’s festive glow. Even with cracker rates shooting up by 20–30%, the city’s enthusiasm for fireworks is burning brighter than ever. As Diwali approaches, Central Avenue and Mahal have transformed into glittering stretches of cracker stalls stacked with sutli bombs, rockets, chakris, anars, and new eco-friendly “green” varieties. Over the weekend, the lanes buzzed with shoppers—families weighing their options while children pointed excitedly at their favourites. Traders admit prices have gone up due to costlier raw materials and transportation, but the demand hasn’t slowed.



“The real joy of Diwali is in the sparkle and sound of crackers,” said a local buyer, summing up the mood that continues to drive brisk sales. According to Ujjwal Chandak, a well-known trader on Central Avenue, each year brings fresh additions to the shelves. “Youngsters go for high-sound crackers like

sutli bombs and rockets, while children love chakris, phuljhadis, and cartoon-themed fireworks,” he said. He added that this year, green crackers have found many takers among parents who want “safer options” for their kids. The festive markets gleam with fairy lights, colourful packaging, and themed gift

boxes. Shoppers, though mindful of the prices, are unwilling to let go of the tradition. “Price increase every year, but the festival just isn’t the same without fireworks,” said another customer while finalising his purchases. Meanwhile, authorities have appealed to citizens to celebrate responsibly. Parents have been advised to keep an eye on children while bursting crackers and to avoid dry or crowded areas. Traders, too, have urged buyers to pick only licensed products and handle them safely. As darkness descends, Nagpur lights up in bursts of colour and sound—proof that even inflation can’t dim the city’s festive spirit.

Nagpur 20 October: Musical Diwali Pahat program by Ashadeep Divya Gunjan group of Apanga, Mahila-Bal Vikas Sanstha, was presented at the premises of the Ganesh Temple in Naik Nelco Society, with the cooperation of the Naik Nelco Society Citizens’ Committee. The event began with a Ganesh Vandana, followed by performances of “Bhoopali Diwali songs, Gondhal, Bhajans, Qawwali, and other musical genres. Adding to the beauty of the morning, the singers also presented a bouquet of melodious old and new Hindi-Marathi songs expressing various human emotions. NMC tender quoted 41.62% below estimate, quality concerns raised

Nagpur 20 October: A tender floated by the Nagpur Municipal Corporation’s Public Works Department has sparked intense debate after a contractor quoted 41.62 percent below the estimated project cost, raising serious concerns over the quality and feasibility of the work. The tender, worth ₹28.99 lakh, was issued on August 21 for installing I-block pavers between Kamal Square and SCS Girls School, Pachpaoli. A total of 28 contractors submitted bids, most offering between 25 to 40 percent less than the estimated cost. However, one contractor’s bid — nearly 42 percent lower — has become the talk of the contracting circles. Senior contractors described it as a “dangerous competition,” warning that such deep underquoting could either



mean inflated official estimates or desperate price-cutting to secure contracts. In both cases, they say, the ultimate risk falls on the quality of public works and the effective use of taxpayer money. Officials claim lower bids help the government save money, but experienced

contractors argue that this trend often leads to poor materials, delayed execution, and cost overruns during later stages. Since the COVID-19 period, tenders quoted 35–45 percent below estimates have become increasingly common. Experts warn that such practices not only hurt contractors but can also cause losses to the civic body itself. Senior members of the contractors’ association said they plan to take up the issue with municipal engineers and urge stricter monitoring to prevent “price dumping” that threatens the quality of public infrastructure.

LAD college crowned inter-collegiate Basketball Champions after defeating RCOEM

Nagpur 20 October: The senior basketball team of LAD College clinched the Inter-Collegiate Senior Basketball Championship, defeating last year’s titleholders, Shri Ramdeobaba College of Engineering and Management, in a commanding performance. LAD secured a 32–22 win, with quarter-wise scores of 11–10, 13–08, 12–00, and 02–00. Key contributions came from Swati Wankhede (13 points), Mitali Kohle (11), Priya Dhapodkar (8), Ruchika Shende (7), and Sharvari Nene (8), whose teamwork and strong defence ensured a convincing victory. Other team members included Prachi Kolhe, Vijaya Hiwse, and Siya Ahuja. The team was coached by Arvind Garud, with constant motivation from Principal Dr. Pooja Pathak. The squad



also received support from Nilima Waghmare, Head of the Sports Department, along with Kajal Tekade and Pragati Ukey. The win stands as a testament to the

players’ discipline, and teamwork, backed by the unwavering encouragement of the college administration.

HC denies bail to key accused in child trafficking syndicate

Nagpur 20 October: In a stern message against organised crime, the Nagpur Bench of the Bombay High Court has denied bail to Sachin Ramesh Patil, a key aide in a notorious child trafficking syndicate, observing that his release could pave the way for similar offences to continue. Justice Vrushi V. Joshi, while rejecting the bail plea, noted that the material on record clearly established Patil’s active involvement in the organised network led by accused Ayesha Maqbool Khan, which allegedly trafficked infants for illegal adoption. “The evidence prima facie shows that the accused actively assisted the organised crime syndicate and is part of the conspiracy. There is no reasonable ground to believe that he is not guilty or that he is unlikely to commit further offences,” Justice Joshi observed in the order. Patil was arrested by Koradi Police under various sections of the Indian Penal Code, the Juvenile Justice Act, and the MCOCA. According to the prosecution, Patil worked closely with the prime accused, Ayesha Maqbool Khan, who headed the child trafficking racket. His role was to identify and connect vulnerable women, to the syndicate, facilitating the illegal transfer of infants for money. Investigators said Patil’s methods mirrored the modus operandi of the gang leader, and at least seven similar cases were already registered against him. Despite the defence’s argument that the trial had been delayed and that the SC had laid down principles favouring bail in prolonged cases, the Court refused to extend relief, citing the strict provisions of Section 21(4) of MCOCA. Justice Joshi observed that before granting bail under MCOCA, the Court must be satisfied that the accused is not guilty and is unlikely to reoffend, conditions that were clearly not met in Patil’s case. The Court further remarked that his release could “hinder the ongoing investigation and embolden the organised network engaged in trafficking.”

Nagpur to get crescent-shaped new Vidhan Bhavan complex

Nagpur 20 October: Following the architectural inspiration of the new Parliament House in Delhi, Maharashtra's winter capital Nagpur is set to get a new crescent-shaped Vidhan Bhavan complex. The ambitious project will transform the State's legislative infrastructure while preserving the existing heritage buildings, sources said. According to the project, the temporary camp offices and barracks of various political parties, including the Congress and BJP, will be demolished to make space for the new structure.

CM Devendra Fadnavis Gifts Diwali Bicycles to 1,099 ASHA Volunteers of Nagpur Municipal Corporation

Nagpur 20 October: In a gesture of appreciation and empowerment, Maharashtra Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis distributed bicycles to 1,099 ASHA volunteers (Accredited Social

Bajrang Dal storms meat shop

Akola 20 October: Tension broke out in Baizpur area of Maharashtra's Akola city on Friday after members of the Bajrang Dal raided a local meat shop, claiming that beef was being sold there. The situation escalated when local Muslim residents confronted the group, accusing them of taking the law into their own hands. According to eyewitnesses, the Bajrang Dal members "stormed" into the shop without any police authority and began accusing the shopkeeper of selling beef.
